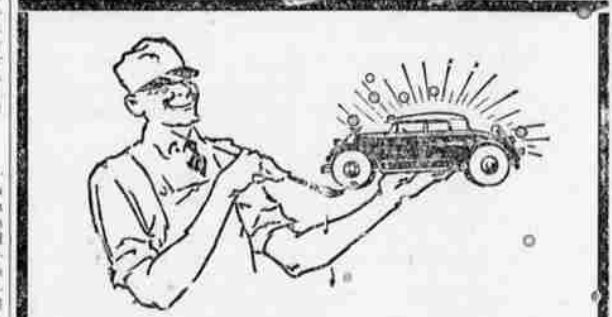
Will Teach at Glendale—Miss Hazel Neese, of Oakland, will teach in the Glendale school this winter.
