

Major League Teams Fight For Places

GIANTS MAY TAKE SECOND BERTH BY GAMES THIS WEEK

The National League, there is the possibility that New York's Giants may take second place away from Pittsburgh, with a strong finish. Battle for the top of the second division is going on between Philadelphia and Brooklyn. The only other question left for the older circuit is whether the champion Cubs can run their total of victories up to 100 games before the end.

The American league has only one real chance among the possibilities. Washington in fifth place and Detroit in sixth may reverse their position before Sunday night. A mathematical possibility remains that St. Louis may gain a tie for third with Cleveland. The Giant-Pirate squabble also is nearer the realm of pure mathematics than of probability. Pittsburgh has a three game edge with as many to go. The Giants have five to play. Brooklyn and Philadelphia are tied for fifth place with three games apiece left. McCarthy's Chicago boys have 55 victories on the books so far and six more possibility in sight. The Cub schedule calls for a five game series at Cincinnati before they close at home against Pittsburgh.

Cleveland fans expect to have little more trouble in clinching third place in the American league. St. Louis has to capture all games to gain a tie.

Washington has a rather tough row to hoe in keeping fifth place out of the hands of Detroit's Tigers. The Senators have only a two game lead over the Athletics. The Athletics and Red Sox, Detroit's schedule calls for a four game series with the lovely White Sox, already beaten in eleven of their 18 encounters this year.

No games were scheduled yesterday.

STANFORD END TO DO STUFF AGAINST OREGON SATURDAY

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 1.—The first conference game of the season here Saturday between Stanford and Oregon universities will offer an opportunity to at least one aspiring gridiron warrior for honors in the field of battle this year.

Phil Nes, 165-pound Stanford end, who can toss a 200-pound tackle like a sack of beans, will replace Johnny Preston, who is on the injured list, and thus get his chance to become the first 1929 freshman to win a regular position with the varsity. Nes, in the game against the San Francisco Olympic club last week proved a revelation to Coach Pop Warner. He will be the first new boy in the starting lineup Saturday.

Strong Punch of Cubs Lies in Outfield, Says Sports Expert

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—It doesn't take more than a quick glance at the figures to realize that the "big punch" of the cub attack is possessed by the outfield trio of Riggs Stephenson, Kiki Cuyler and Hank Wilson.

No one member of the Chicago cast has a thing on the very useful Mr. Aloisius Henry Simmons of the Athletics, who happens to be just about the best all-around outfielder in baseball, but collectively the Cubs have a distinct edge on their rivals on attack. On defense there is little, if anything, to choose, with Simmons and Cuyler ranking as the best of the ball hawkers.

Not since the palmy days of Cobb, Crawford and Veach, the great Detroit trio, has there been any harder outfield group than this Cuyler, Wilson, Stephenson combination. Their batting figure, collectively, on the basis of the latest unofficial averages, is .354, a margin of 18 points over the aggregate mark of .336 for Simmons, Mike Haas and Bing Miller of the A's. The big three of the Cubs has accounted for 67% of the 552 runs scored by the team, either by crossing the plate personally or driving mates over. Their rivals have fanned in 621 of the 552 runs tallied by the A's. Individually Wilson has the best run-producing record in fact.

DEMPSEY'S FIRST BOXING SHOW WILL FEATURE WELTERS

Among a number of vital factors in the Cub rise, few are more conspicuous than the work of the fleet Cuyler, the league's leading base stealer, who has enjoyed his greatest all-around year since he helped the Pirates win the pennant in 1925. Stephenson is less spectacular but the ex-Alabama collegian also has surpassed anything previous in his major league career, with a batting mark that is the highest he ever has had in fast company and second only to Hornsby's in the Cub lineup. When injuries kept either Cuyler or Stephenson out of the game, the Cubs had an able substitute at hand in the speedy Cliff Heathcote.

The development of Haas and the steady work of the veteran Miller contributed much to the triumph of the A's. The former's batting fell off toward the close of the season but when the Mackmen were building up their decisive lead the young centerfielder hit at a sensational clip. Haas hasn't the punch of his rival, Wilson, but he is faster and rangier. Miller, 25 years old and five years older than Stephenson, nevertheless has retained unusual speed as well as a keen batting eye.

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FRISCO REDS TO THREATEN STARS' LEAD THIS WEEK

Pacific Coast league clubs today were camped on new battle grounds for the week, to put the finishing touches on the 1929 season, with the Hollywood Stars in the fore, their league lead still threatened by the San Francisco Mission Reds, although the south-easterners are two full games ahead.

The fact that the Reds were still in the running for second half honors could be credited largely to a lucky break in the final schedule. While the Hollywood club was slated to meet the strong Portland club, the Reds were matched against the lowly Seattle tribe whose sole claim to distinction has been that of holding down the after section of the league all season. Thus, a good week for the Missions might provide a thorny path for the Stars.

Meanwhile, the San Francisco Seals were slated to finish the season against the Sacramento Senators in the latter's home town, and the Angels were to tackle the Oaks in the hot across the bay. As things now stand, the season is doomed to die after next Sunday's games. However, there is a chance for a reprieve in the possibility that a play-off for the pennant may be scheduled. If the Hollywood club wins the second half honors, the 1929 championship will be decided in a seven game series, as was the case last year. Los Angeles and San Francisco would alternately be the battle grounds for the championship play.

COLORED CO-ED AT OREGON DEBARRED FROM DORM. CLAIM

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 1.—Mrs. Charles Maxwell, mother of Makine Maxwell, colored girl who claims she has been debarred from Susan Campbell hall at the University of Oregon because of race prejudice, said today that no arrangements had been yet made for a conference with Governor Patterson, but that such a conference probably would be held.

Governor Patterson said no requests for a hearing had been made of his office. Information from Eugene is that Karl W. Othman, executive secretary of the university, stated that Miss Maxwell applied for a room after all rooms had been applied for. He is said to have denied that the question of color arose. It was said further that Miss Maxwell was allowed to live in the dormitory a few days prior to the arrival of students who were ahead of her in the application for rooms, and that when the rooms were claimed the dean of women located her in comfortable quarters near the campus, with the usual arrangement that she take her meals at the dormitory. She is said to have all privileges in the dormitory organization.

Miss Maxwell is a graduate of Salem high school, and is a popular vocalist. Monday the girl telephoned her mother that she had been informed that she would not be admitted to the dormitory under any conditions.

Mr. and Mrs. Maxwell contend that their daughter should have the same advantages as the children of other citizens and taxpayers, and by living off the campus they declare she would be cut off from many university activities.

EGG GRADING TO BE INVESTIGATED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—Because of the confusion which has prevailed in Portland egg grading, S. C. Morris has been assigned to remedy the situation by State Dairy and Food Commissioner Mickle.
