

35,000 FANS WHO WANT TO SEE BIG GAMES CAN'T GO

(Associated Press Local Wire)
CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—Approximately a million and a half dollars' worth of "regrets" are being made ready for the mails at the office of the Chicago Cubs. At the same time, under restricted mail, will go forth tickets to those fortunate enough to obtain seats for the two, and possibly three, games to be played here.

A check of unfilled orders showed nearly 35,000 applications turned down. Virtually all requests were for two tickets to each of the three games, representing \$1,200, 000 worth of business the club was compelled to turn down for lack of seating facilities.

In addition, President William Veech estimated that between \$250,000 and \$500,000 was returned to persons who sent for more than two tickets.

BIG BOAT AND 32 MEN HELD IN DRY RAID LAST NIGHT

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 1.—A huge lake freighter was impounded, 32 men were in custody and liquor valued at more than \$20,000 was in the possession of federal agents today, the aftermath to the most spectacular raid ever staged in Wisconsin.

Docking here from Windsor, Ont., the S. S. Utica, of Buffalo, N. Y., was met by prohibition and coast guard forces late last night. In virtually every part of the vessel whiskey, rice and wine were found and the belief was expressed that another day's search would unearth more.

Capt. Robert Koch, of Buffalo, the ship's master, and the crew of 32 men were arrested pending a thorough investigation to determine responsibility for the smuggling. They were permitted to remain in their ship quarters for the night, under guard.

Head Was Crushed

HOOVER APPOINTS LAWYER TO STUDY DRY LAW PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—President Hoover announced today that John McNab, attorney of San Francisco, had consented to make a study of federal judicial procedure and administration of the eighteenth amendment and to formulate changes to be recommended to congress in December.

The president's announcement said McNab would work in cooperation with the law enforcement commission and justice and treasury departments.

McNab, the president said, had consented to make the study at the request of Attorney General Mitchell. Secretary Mellon and George W. Wickersham, chairman of the national law enforcement commission.

The president said the general lines of reorganization as regards law enforcement on the administrative side are to centralize the administrative agencies "and thus responsibility for investigation and enforcement into the department of justice."

Asserting that from the studies now under way some definite recommendations to congress are expected at the beginning of the December session, Mr. Hoover repeated the hope that in the meantime congress might appoint the joint committee he recommended on June 6, to study the advisability of the transfer of the prohibition enforcement unit from the department of treasury to the department of justice.

"Such a committee cooperating with the administrative agencies," he asserted, "would enable legislation as it would be formulated with less delay for hearings."

KIDDER'S STORE TO CLOSE OCTOBER 31: HAS OFFER IN EAST

Stanley Kidder, who has conducted a shoe business here for several years, was summoned to Boston, Mass., by wire yesterday, and left on the Santa that afternoon, where important business matters are to be considered. 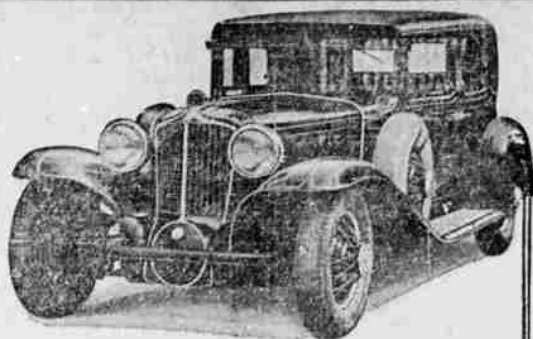

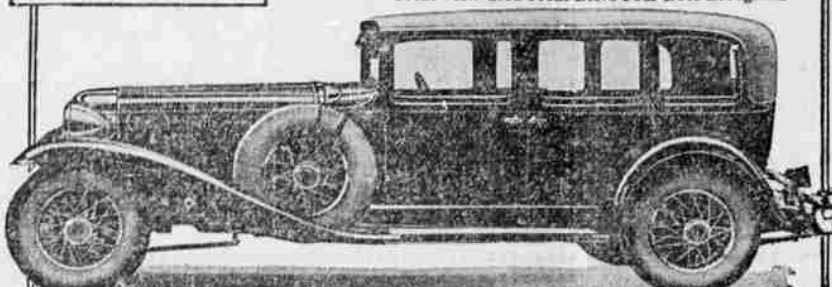

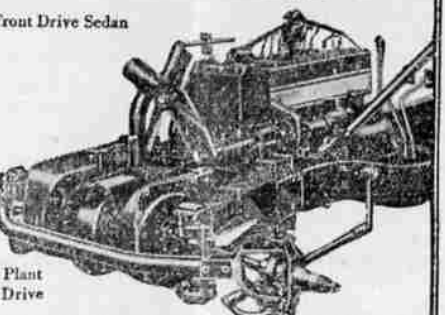

WIFE KILLS MATE AFTER ARGUMENT OVER CARD GAME

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 1.—The bridge game which caused the fatal shooting here yesterday of John G. Bennett by his wife was for but one-tenth of a cent a point and the particular hand which evoked the fatal quarrel made the Bennett losers by 20 cents over a period of three hours of play.

Bennett was shot after an argument which began when his wife angrily termed him "a bum bridge player." Retaliatory words were followed by mounting anger and finally Bennett, western sales manager for a New York perfume company, struck his wife. Sobbing, she rushed to her mother's bedroom and obtained a gun with which she shot her husband twice.

Attempting to construct the circumstances which led to the tragedy, Mr. and Mrs. Charles M. Hofman, with whom the Bennetts were playing, said they did not remember all the cards of the hand which caused the quarrel but agreed that the hand on which Bennett went set, after his wife had raised his one-spade bid to four spades with an intervening bid of two diamonds, was "wonderful."

Mrs. Hofman refused to name the cards in an affidavit but in formally said she believed Bennett held six trumps including two 2's, and that the dummy hand on which his wife raised his bid contained the other three honors.

Mrs. Bennett, a girl in appearance although her husband was 36, was held without bond on a charge of first degree murder. Her attorneys indicated the defense will plead self defense and temporary insanity.

TEN FIRE ALARMS SOUNDED AS VETS FROLIC IN SOUTH

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 1.—Ten fire alarms last night in Louisville's downtown business district, in the area restricted for use of frolic-ing Legionnaires here for the national convention, caused fire department and police officials to express the opinion today that pyromaniacs were at work.

Five firemen were injured in the worst of the flames, which caused damage estimated at more than \$15,000 to a women's apparel store. The origin was undetermined here, but several of the other fires started in piles of waste paper and police, who started an investigation, were convinced these were of incendiary origin.

Hundreds of visiting Legionnaires and the crowds that joined in their fun and noise-making rolled back in solid waves as the apparatus made runs after runs. One crowd was drenched with water thrown from a hose from a building in the rear of one of the fires.

PREACHER TURNS BANK ROBBER, AND THEN KILLS SELF

LE MARS, Iowa, Oct. 1.—For three hours yesterday the Rev. Rex Frolkey fought his way out of the little town of Brooklyn, headquarters camp for the company as a base of operations by the fire fighters reported hurriedly last night that it was impossible to estimate the number of acres already devastated, smoke being so thick the entire valley is in darkness.

The fire had traveled so close that flames were visible from the streets of the town, itself almost in pitch darkness due to the heavy smoke.

Just before Frolkey shot himself in a barn on the farm of his wife, he gave \$300 to P. Dickman, the farm tenant, with the explanation it was money he had obtained in the bank robbery.

License plates on his automobile turned suspicion to Frolkey. Persons who saw the robber, drive from Sioux Center after the hold-up caught the numbers and traced them to Frolkey. Members of a posse went to Frolkey's place and questioned him. His declaration of innocence, coupled with his high standing in the community, influenced them not to arrest him.

Frolkey then went to Dickman, gave him the money, confessed the theft and went to the barn, where he shot himself with the same gun he had used earlier in the day in holding up the bank cashier.

The minister was 38 years old. In his college days at Western Union college here he starred at football. Upon graduation he was ordained to the ministry, but he had not had a pastorate recently. Up to a short time ago his various business activities included operation of radio station KWUC of Le Mars.

The place of yesterday's robbery is 20 miles from here. The robber forced the assistant cashier, one customer and two children in the bank vault. He snatched up all the currency in sight and fled in the Frolkey automobile.

GRAYS HARBOR IN THROES OF WORST FIRE FOR YEARS

HOQUIAM, Wash., Oct. 1.—Transforming the rich virgin timber of the upper North River valley into an inferno of leaping flames and dense smoke, the worst fire of the Grays Harbor section in many years last night was warring into green timber and defying a force of more than 400 fire fighters directed by District Fire Warden Frank Woodcock.

Camp No. 5 of the Saginaw Timber company was wiped out except for three small buildings in the 24-hour sweep of the flames over three sections since late Sunday afternoon when the fire started near Moss creek in a recent slash. Camp No. 2 was moved out just ahead of the flames this morning.

LE BOURGET, France, Oct. 1.—Possibility was advanced here today that Captain Dieudonne Coste and his mechanic, Jacques Beljonte, might have flown within the lines of the Chinese army in Manchuria and have been mistaken for Russian aviators.

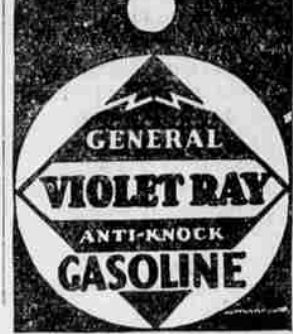
It was feared that in such an event the Frenchmen would have been fired upon and perhaps brought down since their machine was painted red, the color most often associated with the Soviet military.

The two aviators have been missing more than 100 hours since setting out Friday morning for Vladivostok, Siberia. A message

that they had been sighted yesterday flying eastward over Novosibirsk, Siberia, toward Irkutsk, generally was regarded as garbled and as meaning Saturday or early Sunday rather than Monday.

Here in Paris several theories were advanced, that finding most favor being the two fliers were forced down short of Novosibirsk, which is 4,000 miles from Paris, and were flying eastward to refill the gasoline tanks and make a new attempt against the record in a westward flight toward Paris.

Particular attention and care has been given to maternity work including a delivery room and nursery with modern appliances as well as an incubator for the care of premature cases.

There are two surgeries, the major and minor, with operating table of latest design, vacuum drainage, emergency heat, direct and reflected light and a new device operated by electricity for the filtration of the air, absorbing extraneous vapors, deleterious odors and organic matter in the room. In addition to the ordinary anaesthetics used in operations, the surgery has been equipped with ethelene, nitrous-oxide and oxygen for emergency use. Following an operation the surgery will be disinfected by a recently devised electrical equipment, after which it is sealed for future use.
