FORMER RESIDENT
OF YONCALLA DEAD

YONCALLA, Oct. 2.—James H. (Bob) Cannon, of Long Creek, Ore., died in Portland, Ore., Sept. 24, 1929, after an illness of several months. He was a son of the late George and Mary (Cowan) Cannon, early pioneers of Yoncalla and a grandson of the late Robert and Caroline Cowan, pioneers of 1848, first settlers in this valley. Bob, as he was familiarly known, was born on the Cowan donation land claim August 18, 1863, and spent his boyhood days in Yoncalla valley, where he attended the public schools. He was a man of excellent character, and industrious habits, was popular among a large circle of friends, who sincerely regret his passing. He was an honored member of Long Creek lodge No. 90 A. F. & A. M., and a member of Long Creek chapter O. E. S. Funeral services were held Thursday September 26th at Williamina cemetery, where his remains were interred by the side of his wife, who was formerly Miss Etta Bennett of Scotts valley. Mr. Cannon is survived by a brother, John Cannon of Williamina, Ore.; Mrs. Carrie (Cannon) Reed of Ellensburg, Wash.; an aunt, Mrs. Alice Kingsley; two cousins, W. Dale Coran and Gene M. Cowan of Yoncalla. Three married sisters in the state of Washington also survive him.
