SPRINGFIELD MAYOR DIES
EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 2.—Charles O. Wilson, mayor of Springfield, Ore., died at a hospital here today after a major operation he underwent Sunday. He was identified prominently with the civic life of both Eugene and Springfield. Wilson is survived by the widow and four sons.

LOBBY PROBE CONTINUES
WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Activities of the southern tariff league and of groups interested in Muscle Shoals legislation were named today by Senator Caraway, democrat, Arkansas, for inclusion in the senate investigation of lobbyists.

FITTS THREATENED
LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2.—District Attorney Buron Fitts, delving into sensational charges of graft and corruption in the Los Angeles police department, today went about his work under the protecting guns of trusted guards.

Gangster threats said to have been overheard by a police detective lieutenant resulted in protective measures last night. Captain Thomas O'Brien, chief of the district attorney's investigation bureau, said that he had unimpeachable evidence that underworld characters plotted Fitts' death.

SENATE ADOPTS TARIFF
WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The senate today adopted the democratic proposal to restore to congress the power now lodged in the president to change tariff duties after investigation by the tariff commission. The vote was 47 to 41. The democrats won 13 republican votes for their proposal while four democrats voted with the regular republicans against it.

The MacMarr group now will include approximately 1,350 stores.
