regular Saturday grist, and here it is. A man's last will and testament—not a very cheerful subject you will say, but wait until you read it. One of the finest things ever written, I think, and if you live, flowers and outdoors and home and children and all the other fine things in the world I know you will cut it out and save it. Here it is:

A Legacy to Mankind
In the name of God, Amen, I, Charles Lounsbury, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do now make and publish this, my last will and testament, in order, as justly as I may, to distribute my interests in the world among succeeding men.

and I direct that the child's father shall tell him the name of it. In order that the child shall always remember the name of that star after he has learned and forgotten astronomy.

ITEM: I devise to boys, jointly, all the idle fields and commons where ball may be played, all pleasant waters where one may swim, all snow-clad hills where one may coast, and all streams and ponds where one may fish, of where, when grim winter comes, one may skate to have and to hold the same for the period of their boyhood. And all the meadows, with the clover blossoms and buttercups thereof, the woods and their appurtenances, the squirrels and birds and echoes and strains and noises, and all distant places which may be visited, together with the adventures there to be found. And I give to said boys, each his own place at the fireside at night, with
