TODAY'S MARKETS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 5.—With receipts of live and dressed poultry and country meats at a maximum, prices of many varieties were steady today, according to quotations given by the Portland Produce company. The decline ranged from one to two cents a pound on nearly all grades. Pork was one of the meats that remained unchanged at 15c to 16c.

Big prices to wholesalers were unchanged at the Pacific Cooperative. Poultry Producers' but the price spread among retailers was reported to be unusually wide. Fresh extra large eggs, 18 to 19 standards from 32 to 40. Fresh pullets were quoted at 25 and 26. Supplies of local lettuce and cauliflower were increasing, quality was mostly only fair and the market was drab. Except for an occasional fancy lot of these commodities, a bulletin of the Portland Market News Service of the United States Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Price of each was \$1.15 to 1.20 a crate.
