

42 YEARS WEDDED LIFE FOR JUDGE AND MRS. BARNARD

County Judge and Mrs. C. P. Barnard of Eugene celebrated their 42nd wedding anniversary Friday, according to word received here. Mr. Barnard, who is now county judge of Lane county, was formerly in business here and the family resided in Roseburg for many years.

They were married at Minneapolis, Minn., October 4, 1887, and three years after their marriage came to Oregon, residing in Douglas and Lane counties practically continuously since that time. In addition to having property interests in Douglas county, Judge Barnard, during his residence here, operated stage lines from Roseburg to Marshfield over the old Coos Bay highway. He inaugurated the first automobile stage line between Roseburg and the coast and maintained it for several years.

After disposing of his interests here he went to Eugene, where he purchased a large farm. He was selected as county judge and has served for a number of years, receiving large majorities over all opponents each time he has been up for reelection.

The anniversary was quietly celebrated at home. Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Harder, daughter and son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Barnard were present from Portland.

tion and freedom, Daniels realized he had killed all that blood in vain. "We will never hang," he said several times.

Leader Slays Self

Purdue, wounded by a guard in the first skirmish at noon, a few hours later was shot through the stomach by Daniels to "put him out of his misery." Early Friday morning Daniels shot and killed his three companions. He told one of the three remaining guards to notify authorities they were giving up. The guard doubted, but later crept to the cell where the men were. He struck a match and saw he was in a tomb—Daniels had ended his own life and lay dead among the others.

The guard, O. A. Earl, notified the authorities and other convicts who were cowed in the cellhouse with the five murderers, fled out, cursing, hands high in the air. The rioting was over.

Sheepish Look and Grins Appear on Faces of Cowed Colorado Convicts as They Are Herded Back to Cells

CANON CITY, Colo., Oct. 4.—One by one, their arms above their heads, the convicts in cell house number three of the Colorado state penitentiary were marching out into the gray of Friday morning to face a semi-circle of guns held by a hastily organized group of national guardsmen, prison guards and citizens.

The word that the surrender was imminent traveled like wildfire after a guard had appeared within the barred enclosure and shouted to the small group of watchers outside the wall. Col. Paul P. Newton, adjutant general of the national guard, was about to start on a tour of his posts, hastily summoned nearby guardsmen and ran to the gate.

The outer gate swung open, and then the inner gate. Guns held in readiness, the group approached the gridded doorway cautiously, treading on a carpet of windows of the national guard, was about to start on a tour of his posts, hastily summoned nearby guardsmen and ran to the gate.

A key clicked in the lock, the door swung open and the first of the prisoners shuffled out into the open. Most of them looked sheepish and not a few broke into nervous half grins as the guards searched them for weapons with practiced hands. Negro and white, they lumbered across the narrow enclosure separating cell houses numbers 3 and 1, to line up against the wall.

Apprehensive of trouble, individual guards entered the low doorway, poked their revolvers against the ribs of the prisoners and marched back out. For perhaps fifteen minutes the group of convicts swelled in numbers. Still the silence prevailed. E. E. Riley waiting on the two groups in the yard.

It was over. A rumor ran through the crowd that in a particular tier of cells inside the place a number of prisoners still armed and awaiting attack. Guns in their crooked arms, guards stepped through the doorway. The place was empty of human life, echoing the footsteps like a tomb.

If a tornado had swept through the place it could not have presented a more desolate picture. The concrete floor was covered at almost regular intervals with blood splashes, fast coagulating. Here the guards had already dragged out of the cells the bodies of the slain convicts. Harry Daniels, notorious ring leader, lay marble like, prostrate in a corner of the building.

Two feet away lay a guard, features smeared with blood and at his head lay another guard. Around the corner of the first tier of cells the death lines stretched, the guards in their dull blue uniforms and gold braided caps, the convicts in their green trousers and blue shirts.

The darkened cells were in tumult. Mattresses lay scattered on the floors and more than one cell had a supply of bread, snatched from the dining room to insure food for a long siege when the riot began. One cell was brightened by a crucifix on the wall, another by a half dozen crude oil paintings, a third by straw hats with brilliant cords about their crowns.

Machine gun bullets had chipped holes in the yellow walls of the cell tiers, broken glass lined the corridors, further evidence of the dynamite explosions.

A bare ten feet from the inside door to the death house was the stone framework of what had once been the dining room. Beams still smoldered amid the brick and mortar which had tumbled down as the flames raced through the building the previous night. A cell door creaked on its hinges and a loosened brick fell the brilliant sunlight.

Across the small court from the front entrance to the death house was cell number 1 blackened like the other, its gaunt framework testifying to the fury of the flames.

Outside, before the now passionless faces of the convicts, who had surrendered, a bright gray hearse drew up, its motor muzzling. Sunlight had reached yellow fingers into the recesses of the yard and the prisoners blinked in its glare. The bodies of two guards on stretchers were carried out and loaded in. The hearse moved off.

Another drew up and the bodies of two more prisoners were placed inside, then a third, and the cell house had been emptied of its burden of dead. From the lips of a guard issued a sharp metallic order. The prisoners shuffled into line, executed a right face and marched off. On the corner of cell house number 3 perched three pigeons, preening themselves in the brilliant sunlight.

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EXTENSION OF DRY WEATHER NEEDED FOR PRUNE CROP
A few more days of good weather will put the prune harvest "over the top," according to County Agent J. C. Leedy. Ideal conditions have prevailed thus far, and a continuation of good weather will be of great benefit.

About one-half of the crop has been dried or is in the driers, it is estimated, and a week more will complete the rush, although there will be some drying after that length of time. The greatest difficulty at present is the lack of drier space. The crop is by far the largest the county has ever known and driers are being crowded by the very limit.

The driers are not keeping pace with the crop, but as long as the ground remains warm and dry, the prunes are not damaged by reason of being left on the ground for a short time. A rain, however, will cause them to rot, and a heavy loss would result in such case. If, on the other hand, the weather remains good, as present prospects indicate, for four or five more days, the peak of the harvest will be over and the driers will be able to take care of the fruit as fast as it falls and there will be little further difficulty. The weather bureau predicts fair and cooler weather for today and Sunday, and at present there are no indications of rain.

The prunes are of excellent size, Mr. Leedy reports, and the quality has shown considerable improvement over the fruit dried during the early part of the season. The prunes, particularly the Italians, are somewhat under their normal sugar content, due it is believed to lack of sunshine during the ripening season, when the smoke haze obscured the sun, and are therefore ripening a little lighter in weight than usual.
