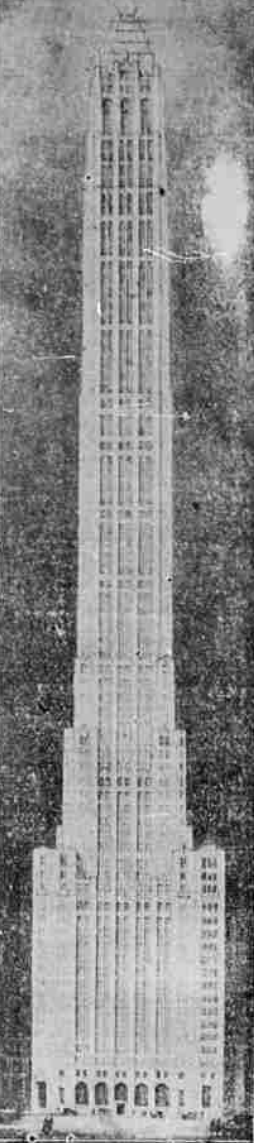
**Start on Hunting Trip—**

Plans have been filed for the erection of a new 71-story office building which will rise 925 feet above the ground, on the block by Exchange Place, Beaver, William and Hanover streets in the financial district of New York. As far as official records show this will be the tallest building in the world, but its glory will be short lived when plans are filed for a new structure on the site of the old Waldorf Astoria hotel on 34th street, which will tower 1,900 feet above the city's streets.

## Mrs. McPherson's Beauty Bill Causes Followers to Desert Her

Almee Simple McPherson, Los Angeles evangelist, spent \$40.50 on beauty treatments while she was in Detroit, Mich., on a recent soul saving campaign, and thereby alienated herself from followers in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana, according to an announcement made by the Rev. Dawson MacCullough.

"And that \$40.50 for facials and marcel wasn't all," said Mr. MacCullough, who was formerly State Superintendent of the Four Square Gospel, the religious faith founded by Mrs. McPherson.

He said total expenses for her fifteen-day evangelistic campaign in Detroit amounted to \$19,608 and left a deficit of \$9,171 for the local church which had guaranteed expenses.

When the congregation protested strongly, Mr. MacCullough said Mrs. McPherson sent a check for \$500.

Her bills included hotel, \$674; personal, \$180; flowers, \$53, and unexplained miscellaneous items, \$395.

The hotel bill included five cents for a newspaper, \$142.50 for meals and \$40.50 for beauty treatments.

Mr. MacCullough said the bills indicated that Mrs. McPherson had "financially betrayed" her Michigan followers.

married daughter residing at Estacada, Dr. Royal Clark, Eugene, physician, from whom mail addressed to the woman was found in a Spokane hotel, said he did not remember Mrs. Johnson and that the mail was probably advertising matter he issued.

Mrs. Johnson was a public stenographer in Roseburg for several years, with offices in the Roseburg National bank building. She moved from this city to Eugene more than ten years ago. Her former husband, William P. Johnson, promoted sawmill ventures at Myrtle Creek and Glendale, in partnership with his brother, Curtis Johnson, both of whom came to this county from Erie, Pennsylvania. In addition to her own ranch, being at Estacada, Mrs. Johnson is survived by a step-daughter, Mrs. Maurice Maiden, of Long Beach, California. Mr. Maiden is a brother of Mrs. W. A. Burr of Riverdale, formerly part of the Curry estate, northwest of Roseburg.
