

ROSEBURG SENIORS START GRID CARD WITH HARD TASK

Inexperienced Team Going Into Friday's Battle Against Heavier Coos Eleven.

The Roseburg senior high school football team will have its first game Friday, meeting Myrtle Point on the local field. The local team, it is believed, is taking on the hardest game of the season as an opener, as the Myrtle Point squad is the heaviest in the southwestern Oregon conference and it also has more experienced players than most of the other teams.

Roseburg this year has a very inexperienced team. There are only nine men on the squad who have ever played football previous to this year, and only six of that number are lettermen. Three of the six were substitutes on last year's team but not in enough time to secure a letter.

With such an inexperienced squad Coach Turner has had to give a great deal of time this year to fundamentals of the game, and the boys have not had enough scrimmages.

In meeting the Myrtle Point team they will be pitted against a line that will be from 14 to 17 pounds heavier to the man, as the Myrtle Point line averages more than 150 pounds. The backfield of the visiting team is also heavy and fast.

The opening game, Coach Turner says, is going to be perhaps the hardest of the season. He believes that the Roseburg team, hurrying before the end of the season is reached, but are woefully inexperienced at present.

Roy Lamb, assistant coach at Oregon State has been secured as referee. Lamb was all-state quarterback for Illinois for four years, and played for several years professionally with the Chicago Cardinals.

Friday's game will start at 2:30.

It is being filmed for the purpose of advertising the Douglas county prunes to stimulate sales. J. C. Leedy, county agent, accompanied the three men to the 50-acre Hassenback ranch at Melrose, where the first pictures were taken. This ranch has an ideal setting, as the house and buildings are entirely surrounded by orchards. Pictures were taken of the helpers picking the prunes, close-ups of the orchards and camps, prunes being hauled to the dryer and the process of drying. The men got on the roof of the dryer and took many splendid orchard views. One of the girl prune pickers was starred in the picture. Several close-ups were taken of her carrying the fruit and displaying it in different ways.

The four men then left for Weston, where pictures were taken of the H. A. Winston and Clay Smith orchards.

This film, when finished and released, will be shown all over the United States and an application for patents, will make a good show has been made for its showing in Roseburg at the first opportunity. However, it will probably be several months before it will be ready for exhibition.

PRUNE MARKET HERE REACHES CHAOTIC STATE

criticizing" one of the packers commented today. "They fail to understand our position. The buyers paid big prices this year, and now the prune market has shown signs of falling off. Naturally the brokers, who are buying from us, have contracted to buy at certain prices, upon which we based our bids for the growers' fruit, and are looking for some escape. If we sell them fruit that is not fully up to the standards on which we contracted with them, then we will have to take a heavy loss in adjustments. Therefore, we must be extremely careful in the stuff that we accept, and must demand perfect quality."

"Then, too, we are shipping this year to markets that we have never touched before. Because California's crop is so short, many markets are open this year that we have not touched in years. Mid-western markets are buying Italian prunes this season for the first time. If we send good fruit we can expect repeat orders, but if the quality is not good then we can never expect to ship to those points again. Consequently, we must be strict in our grades and requirements."

Growers Allege Dodge Prune growers, on the other hand, claim that the packers made attractive offers to get the prunes and are now trying to beat the growers down by over strict rejections and are trying to get out of their contracts, using the weak market condition as a club. Dissatisfaction is particularly strong among the association members, many of whom claim that the packers are deliberately trying to wreck the organization.

This latter situation is resulting in a great deal of talk among some of the larger association growers in favor of a processing plant to be built and operated by the association, where the fruit of the members will be graded and packed and sold through trade channels to be opened up by the organization.

The situation has reached a point where some of the growers are consulting with the attorneys regarding law action to force the

packers to accept prunes held by the growers to be up to specifications, and a legal tangle may be injected into the difficulties.

OIL FIELD SINKS, BIG LOSS RESULTS

(Associated Press Local Wire) BEAUMONT, Tex., Oct. 10.—Loss of hundreds of thousands of dollars in oil land was threatened today through the unexplained sinking of about seven acres of land in the Sour Lake oil field, 25 miles west of here, which has created a deep lake here only yesterday stretched an expanse of waving marsh and small trees. Sides of the pit still were crumbling today as the fall of earth continued.

Derrick and storage tanks were being removed from the edge of the great hole, estimated at from 50 to 150 feet deep, which filled with water yesterday as the surface steadily fell through hour after hour. Thirteen wells were shut down and an abandoned derrick, a boiler and six settling tanks were engulfed.

Effect on adjacent oil wells was almost immediate. One well making 10 barrels a day before the now lake was formed now is making 250 barrels. On the other side of the great depression a well making 155 barrels a day Tuesday is spouting salt water today. The well was brought in Saturday with an initial flow of 250 barrels a day.

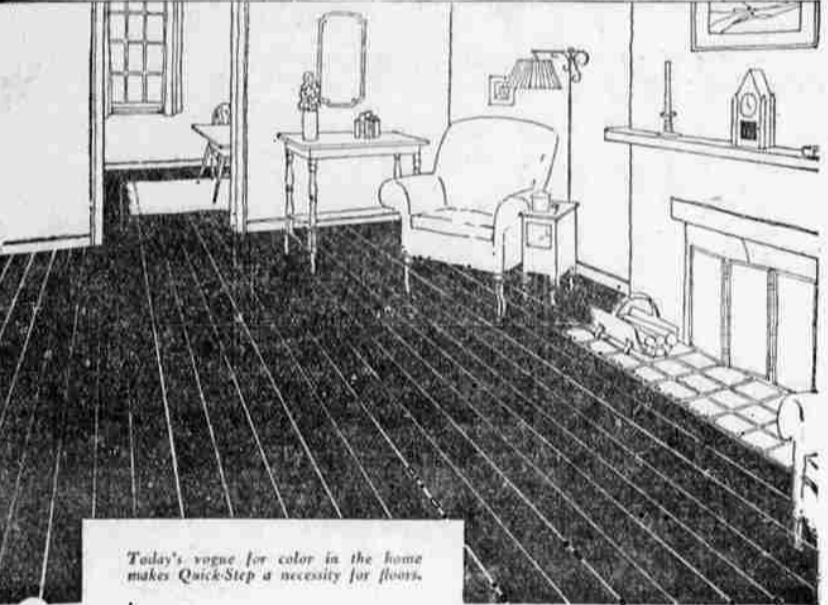
