"COUNTY-WIDE—DAY OF PRIDE"

IT IS NOT often in the life of any municipality that it has the opportunity of celebrating the erection and dedication of a building so fine and so beautiful as is the new Douglas county courthouse. The slogan committee chose wisely indeed, the slogan: "County-wide—day of pride." Douglas county should be very proud. Douglas county is proud. Few people realize, however, that our new courthouse is perhaps the only public building in Oregon of Class "A" construction. This term is used in insurance circles to designate construction that is practically fire proof and other wise excellent. In the new building, county records will be forever safe and well kept; county employees will be more comfortable and consequently more efficient in their work. The new courthouse is a decided achievement for Douglas county and the slogan "County-wide—Day of Pride" is expressive of the feeling over the county at dedicating the new structure.

Come, Saturday the 19th, and attend the celebration.

People who daily pass the courthouse are fearful lest the front grounds will not be completely cleaned up and made ready for the dedication ceremony. They point out that it will cost no more to clean now than later and that it would be a terrible thing to have the grounds in bad condition the day of the dedication. The county court, however, several months ago, set the date October 19th and promised to have the grounds in reasonable shape by that time. Only lately the court has reassured the committee, that is working on the celebration plans, that the grounds will be put in shape. It is a big task and will require a large crew of men working every day between now and a week from Saturday to finish the job. The court has promised that the work will be finished by the 19th, and Douglas county is depending on that.

aggrandizement.

ODD burial rites are as old as the human race. Curiously enough, agriculture is supposed to have arisen out of the burial rites of Neolithic man.

The bodies of the dead were buried in mounds, and to make these mounds it was necessary to dig up the ground. In the process of digging, seeds of food grains fell upon the newly turned earth, sprouted and flourished.

Later it was observed that in these spots the grain grew to an unusual size and perfection, and this fact was noted and taken advantage of.

BUT Neolithic man, like his modern descendants, was unfortunately prone to draw wrong conclusions from observed facts.

Instead of grasping the truth that the grain on the burial mounds grew luxuriantly because the earth had been stirred and fertilized, he leaped to the wrong conclusion that the dead body was the cause. And so, through hundreds of generations, it became the custom to make a human sacrifice at planting time in the belief that thus good crops were assured.

We have traveled far since those days, but we still draw some astonishingly wrong conclusions from simple facts.
