## O. & C. LAND GRANT MONEY SOUGHT ON SPECIAL MISSION

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11.—John R. Latourette and his brother, E. C. Latourette, of Oregon City left for Washington, D. C. Wednesday to represent Clackamas and Multnomah counties in an attempt to obtain the payment of approximately \$100,000 contended by them to be due Clackamas, together with \$25,000 due Multnomah, on account of the O. & C. grant lands.

Under the Chamberlain-Ferris bill revesting the Oregon & California grant in the federal government, and payment of moneys equivalent to accrued and accruing taxes, the government each year pays to the 18 grant land counties approximately \$500,000.

However, certain of the forest lands to the O. & C. grant have been included in the forest reserve area by the land department, and it is contended in Washington that these lands have, by reason of the transfer or departmental assignment, become "forest reserves" and not "revested" lands. Consequently, the government has not

been including accrued or accruing advances from these areas.

It is the contention of Latourette that the mere inclusion of these grant land areas within the departmental classification as forest reserve lands does not, in fact or under the terms of the Chamberlain-Ferris or the Stanford acts, change their status as grant lands and therefore subject to the federal payments to the state. The two attorneys will argue this contention before the department at Washington and attempt to secure a reversal of the ruling and consequently payment of the sums accumulated and insisted to be due.
