CREDIT WHERE CREDIT IS DUE

THERE is some consternation in the ranks of Douglas County poultrymen over the statement emanating from Portland that Mr. Kipp, the marketing man for the Portland Chamber of Commerce rendered considerable assistance in putting over the recent drive for poultry association members.

Mr. Kipp has at different times rendered splendid service to this county. He was active in bringing order into the pruned situation here and is a capable man. If he had been in Douglas county during the drive for members he undoubtedly would have been able to give material assistance. The fact is, though, that the drive was successfully conducted by local men. County Agent J. C. Leedy and Jim Clark worked nearly night and day on the drive. The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce contributed \$100.00 to help the drive and its secretary worked with Mr. Leedy and Mr. Clark on the drive. Other poultrymen were active and the entire membership in this territory turned to and helped put the drive across. The reason that the poultrymen here were so active was that the success of the drive meant the establishment of a packing plant here. That plant, through the efforts of active and public spirited local men, will soon be under construction.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce is doing splendid work for the state as a whole and this is not written in the spirit of criticism. It is the intention here to give credit where credit is due, for a fine piece of work. The Portland chamber had nothing to do with the drive for members in the poultrymen's cooperative association here.

EDUCATION FOR SERVICE

The correspondent of the New York Times writes this from Hawaii:

"With 70,000 children entering the public schools of Hawaii today, the start of the academic year, plans have been announced by Governor Lawrence M. Judd for a threefold educational survey to be undertaken in the territory if it meets the approval of the general public and the next legislature.

"The proposed inquiry would cover the schools themselves, the industries of the group of islands and a combination of schools and industries. A check would be made of the general curriculum, including subject matter and teaching technique, the grading system in vogue relating to student classification and retention, the teacher training program at the territorial normal school and vocational education. Industry in Hawaii is inseparably tied up with the results of education, the governor commented in announcing his survey plan. In order to know what type of training or how much should be offered in the schools from a vocational standpoint it is necessary, first, to know what opportunities in industry are available throughout the territory. It is therefore absolutely essential that the school and industry be coordinated."

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ROGUE RIVER BLASTING BRINGS FISH COMPLAINT

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11.—Harold Clifford, state game warden, said today the state game commission would investigate several complaints received from upper Rogue river sportsmen concerning a certain project on the river at Rainy Falls, 20 miles below Grants Pass.

Ralph Cowgill, commission engineer, blasted near the falls to change the channel in an effort to

make it easier for fish to move upstream.
Instead of improving the channel, according to complaints, the blast made it harder for fish to move up the river because water now falls on rocks in shallow water and moves faster.
