THE NEW HOSPITAL

FRIDAY and Saturday of last week the new Roseburg hospital was opened to public inspection. People who took advantage of the opportunity to be shown through the hospital were surprised. Work has gone ahead quietly and quickly. It is only a short time since the top floors of the Perkins building were office rooms, now after an interval of only a few weeks they are remade into one of the most modern and fine hospitals to be found anywhere. Few people realized how thorough the building was being done, or how well equipped it would be. Fine accommodations are now provided for twenty-two patients and this includes but one floor. The third floor is being rapidly converted and the total bed capacity of the new hospital when it is entirely completed will be 42. This, by the way, is a large hospital for a city of this size. There is a good reason for preparing such a large hospital, according to the men who are interested in it. The plan is to make Roseburg a central point for hospitalization for a very large territory in southwestern Oregon. Nor is this just a hope. Plans are very definitely under way which, if they materialize, will bring this about. The builders of the new hospital are sincere, they have built well. Their purpose in building is, they say, not to divide the present business with existing institutions but they intend to fill their hospital with patients who, in the normal course of events are not now coming to Roseburg for hospitalization. This is a laudable purpose and is genuinely progressive. A new business institution which merely competes for and divides existing trade, does not necessarily improve the community. The new hospital expects to bring new business here.

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FARM LOAN TOTAL PAID OUT SO FAR NEARLY \$700,000

(Associated Press London Wire)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Applications for loans from the federal farm board totaled approximately \$700,000 September 30. Chairman of the board reveals in a statement to the senate committee on agriculture.

Of that amount, the chairman said, \$37,000,000 tentatively has been approved by the board. Only \$58,000 actually has been called for.

Interpreted according to the board's policy of making loans, the amount "called for" represents the sum of cooperative have qualified to receive. The \$37,000,000 is approved, providing the cooperative seeking to borrow it can satisfy the board's demands in regard to organization, previous acquisition of loans from the federal intermediate banks, and security.

"In by far the larger number of cases," Mr. Legge explains, "instead of sending in a definite request or application for a loan, individuals or groups representing cooperatives have appeared before us to find out just how to go about it."

"In some of these cases, such as applications for loans on farm land, we have advised the applicants that we did not feel they were within the scope of our activities and have referred them to the federal farm loan board. "In many cases the discussions developed the fact that the cooperative had not had an audit of its business for a considerable period of time, or in the case of plant facilities, that they had not been appraised in recent years."

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 2.—Editor of the News-Review: The school law of the state of Oregon provides a way for the education of high school students who are residents of the rural districts. It practically all couples of the state this law is in operation but in Douglas county the situation has not been cleared up to the satisfaction of the high schools and created outside students.

For some time past the fund created by the tax levy made by the county court has been insufficient to pay the several amounts due from year to year. On August 1, 1929, the account showed the following:

For the year 1928-27, unpaid	\$12,315.00
For the year 1927-28, unpaid	21,720.12
Total arrears	44,035.12
1928-29 reports show due	40,996.40
Grand total	\$84,131.52

The law states "the county school superintendent shall appropriate the county high school tuition fund for each of such high school districts * * * the total cost to each of such high school districts of educating high school students * * * the county school superintendent shall draw an order on the county treasurer against the county high school fund."

In Douglas county the superintendent has been led to believe that the order could not be drawn until the amounts had actually been collected. Opinions of the state attorney general, decisions by the state courts and instructions from the state department of education make the matter definite that the amounts shall be paid in full each year and that the superintendent shall apportion the various amounts without any regulation from the county court.

Mrs. Edith S. Ackert had decided to adhere to the rulings above made and had commenced arrangements to apportion the total amounts due as above. Later, on advice of the county attorney, she was instructed to apportion only an amount which had been actually levied. No previous similar opinion has ever been rendered and no court ruling has been made upholding that idea. Mrs. Ackert did proceed to pay out the amount which had been levied and so the amount in arrears to the various schools was reduced.

Now as to the position of the county court: The school law is definite in stating that "the county court * * * must * * * levy a special tax * * * sufficient in amount to defray cost, for the current year, of educating all high school pupils residing in the county and not in any high school district." The language is clearly mandatory, yet the county courts in Douglas county have consistently violated the spirit of the ruling.

In Baker county a test case was made: when the county court refused to levy a sufficient tax, it was compelled by mandamus to do so.

The county court is expected to base the amount of its levy on estimates furnished to the court by the office of the county school superintendent. An examination of the records in the superintendent's office shows that the superintendent has made the estimates each year in such an amount as would pay all tuition in full. Each year she has included the past deficiencies in the estimates but the county court has not levied a sufficient amount and as a result the deficiency is increasing rapidly each year. In 1928-29 the total reports showed that \$48,096.40 was necessary to pay all districts in full for the one year alone. The assessment roll shows that the county court levied \$25,937.96. Such a procedure cannot continue indefinitely.

An increase in tax rate on the non-high school districts is necessary to remedy the situation and this rate will need to be quite high to cover all deficiencies of the past.

With these increases bound to come on the outside territory there will be a desire on the part of the rural districts to join with existing high school districts in the formation of union high schools, by so doing they will be exempt from the tax levied to support the county high school tuition fund. Such a movement is already on in Drain where several districts have signed petitions to form a union high school; the sentiment is growing in other sections.

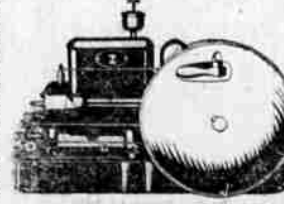
