BRANDEGEE MURDER VICTIM, WRITER OF LETTER BELIEVES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—The Washington Evening Star says today that Senator Brandegee of South Carolina had received a letter expressing the belief that the late Senator Frank B. Brandegee of Connecticut was murdered. At the time of his death in 1924, a coroner's jury had reported death occurred from suicide.

The Star added Brandegee had received the letter from a woman and proposed to place it before a senate committee investigating the Washington police department.

GYMNASIUM BEING FITTED BY BOXING PROMOTER WIARD

Clyde Wiard, local boxing promoter, is preparing to fill one of the long-felt needs in this city by installing a well-equipped gymnasium in the quarters formerly occupied by the Moose lodge in the Douglas Abstract company building. Mr. Wiard has leased the hall and is now installing apparatus of a character to meet all needs.

He has erected a large boxing ring, put in exercise rings, punching bags, weight bags, exercisers, rowing machine, wrestling mat and a great deal of additional equipment for conditioning and muscle building. Nearly all of the apparatus has been received and is now being put in place.

He is also preparing to build a locker room and will put in shower baths and rubbing tables. A special section is planned for a ladies' gymnasium.

The gymnasium is to be used to condition boxers appearing in local contests and he also is preparing to form an athletic club in which business men or others feeling a need of light exercise can secure membership entitling them to use of the gymnasium at all times.

The Roseburg chamber of commerce office will resemble a state fair booth Saturday, the day of the county celebration. Ritter and Ritter, of the Umpqua gardens and truck farm, west of town, have brought to the office one of the finest vegetable displays ever seen in this city. They will have on display Black Beauty egg plant, Gurnsey parsnips, Copenhagen cabbage, Chatney carrots, flowering artichokes, Choucroute, Henderon head lettuce, tomatoes and a general display of garden and truck farm products.

They have demonstrated conclusively the fact that pimientos, which it has been claimed could not be grown here, mature to wonderful quality in the Umpqua valley and can be grown commercially. All of the products exhibited will be of exceptional quality and will be examples of what can be done in the way of gardening in the Umpqua valley.

In addition to these articles there will be a fine grain display, grapes and various kinds of fruit that have been brought in by other exhibitors.
