

## ALLEGED VENDOR OF BONDS SUPPOSED BURNED INDICTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 17.—A complaint charging John R. Nesbitt, Portland, with offering for sale \$17,500 worth of Interstate Utilities company bonds, believed to be burned in a bank furnace here when the Spokane, Wash., firm ordered a new issue, was filed yesterday in district court and bail was fixed at \$5,000.

Because Nesbitt was not at home, he was not placed under arrest and authorities were ordered to guard the residence to serve the warrant upon his appearance. The district attorney's office announced that Nesbitt, who is a Portland real estate dealer and 71 years old, had been watched several days. Nesbitt, the district attorney said, offered bonds to Portland dealers at 50 per cent discount, although at the time the bonds were listed on the market at 105.

Nesbitt is said to have shown but two of the bonds, but told dealers he knew a man who had enough to make up the \$17,500. He said the district attorney said authorities believe these are the bonds which found their way to San Francisco where \$14,000 were purchased and returned to Portland for collection after the issue had been called in.

Authorities said Nesbitt is known to have traded one of the bonds for a lot in Washington to a former real estate dealer now residing in Des Moines, Iowa, where one of the resuscitated bonds appeared.

The bonds were supposed to have been burned in the American bank building, Portland, under the direction of a Spokane representative of the utilities company. Howard Polle, former engineer of the bank building, is held in jail pending the filing of charges and further investigation. He is alleged to have been present when the \$250,000 bond issue was placed in the furnace.

## POWER UNITS ON LEWIS RIVER WILL COST MILLIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 16.—The Infant Power and Light company, a subsidiary of Northwestern Electric company, announced today that work will start immediately on the 54,000 horsepower development project on the Lewis river in Washington. The federal power commission today granted the license for the work.

Known as the Ariel Development project, the first of four power units will be constructed twelve miles above Woodland, Wash., on the north fork of the Lewis river. The first unit will cost \$9,000,000. Additional units will be constructed as needed at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000 each. Five hundred men will be employed this winter, and the company said 2,000 employees will be working on the project by next summer.

Power will be furnished Portland, Vancouver, Camas, Washougal, Kalama, Rainier and Woodland, as well as rural Clark county, Washington.

## LOGGER LOSES LIFE IN FOOLISH STUNT

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, Oct. 17.—Foolhardy daring, which sent him hurtling at breakneck speed down a steep log chute into a mass of whirling timber and waves, today was blamed for the death of William Stewart, 18, of Spokane, Wash.

After work yesterday Stewart and a group of lumberjacks started for camp down a steep mountain trail near here. Instead of continuing down the path, the youth leaped onto a log ready to be sent down the flume into a creek below. Other lads, men who had driven logs since they were boys, warned the lad of almost certain death in the grinding mass below, but he waved defiantly and rode on.

Near the bottom the flume, with the log shooting at mile a minute speed, he lost his footing and plunged into the creek to be crushed between the logs whirling in the turbulent water.

## FEDERATION HITS 'CONSCRIPTION OF LABOR IN WARTIME'

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 17.—With-out dissent or debate the convention of the American Federation of Labor today expressed its opposition to measures pending before congress for universal conscription in time of war.

It adopted a committee report declaring it to be "essential as an evidence of good faith in the world that the American people shall, at least for the present, refrain from war-like preparations in the enactment of legislation."

Conscription of labor in wartime, it added, would mean that "trades unions would be dissolved."

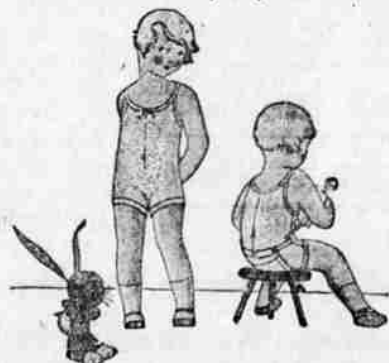

## BARNES' ELEPHANT WHO SLEW WOMAN PAYS WITH LIFE

KEMENY, Tex., Oct. 17.—"Taken for a ride" by his own herd mates and "on the spot" by his human friends of the circus lot, Black Diamond, rogue elephant, who Saturday killed a woman as Corsicana, Texas, was executed here yesterday. Short machine guns like those employed by gangsters were employed by his executioners.

With Black Diamond's death the Al G. Barnes circus lost between ten and fifteen thousand dollars but rid itself of an animal which, according to its former trainer, had killed three people.

Circus elephant men who conducted the execution yesterday took no chances on a repetition of Saturday's tragedy, in which the elephant, with no apparent provocation, seized and crushed to death Mrs. Eva Donahoe, a spectator.

When a huge grave had been prepared in a cow pasture about two miles from town, the elephant handlers gave him the familiar rallying cry for the parade and he lumbered into position as he had been accustomed to do for years. Three of his herd mates were yoked to him with chains to make certain he would not stampede. A group of circus people and curious townspeople followed him in his lumbering death march. The elephant, a magnificent 137-year-old bull, one of the tallest in captivity, was a dramatic figure as he went unsuspiciously to his death and many of his old friends had tears in their eyes.

Near the grave Black Diamond was firmly chained to three trees and Hans Nagel, director of the Houston zoo, and Adria Hines, a taxidermist, who wished to save the head for the Houston institution, took charge.

Lead Poured Into Body  
The first burst of lead fired in to the body of the nine-ton pachyderm seemed to puzzle the animal. Another burst made him groggy. He rolled over slowly and took another fusillade in the body. The executioner then gave Black Diamond the "coup de grace," a single well directed shot in the brain, and the circus had done with him. After the head had been removed workmen tugged and hauled at the huge body until it rolled into the grave.

According to the theory advanced by H. D. Prickett, Black Diamond's trainer before he left the circus to work for Mrs. Donahoe, jealousy and a long memory were responsible for the tragedy Saturday. In his hospital bed in Corsicana, where he is recovering

from injuries received when he tried to save Mrs. Donahoe, he said the elephant saw Mrs. Donahoe with him when he said goodbye to it and to the circus. Prickett believed the elephant remembered and charged the woman because he had seen him leave with her. The former trainer had gone to the railroad yards as the show pulled in and had been allowed to lead his old charge to the circus lot. It was on this trip that the tragedy occurred.

There are also eight grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

The funeral will be held from the Schroeder & Gane chapel, in Coquille, Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, and the remains brought to Douglas county for interment in the Civil Bend cemetery.

## SECRET PAPER IN SHEARER CASE HELD PHYSICIAN'S WORK

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—The New York Sun says today that Dr. William J. M. Maloney, specialist in nervous diseases, is on record as admitting authorship of the satire on British propaganda in the United States, which is said to be the basis of the "secret British document" submitted by William H. Shearer to the senate committee investigating the activities of American shipbuilders at the 1927 Geneva naval conference.

The Sun says that in an article in the Irish press of Philadelphia July 23, 1921, Dr. Maloney said that he wrote the pamphlet "The Reconquering of America." The pamphlet appeared in June, 1919, and purported to be a reprint of a paper found in the street in front of an apartment house in this city in which Sir William Wiseman, once chief of the British secret service in America had lived. The pretended document bore no signature, but it appeared to be a report made by a

British agent in America to Lloyd George, then British prime minister.

Published reports had said that Daniel F. Cohalan, former state supreme court justice, and now counsel for Shearer, had collaborated with Dr. Maloney in preparing the document, but Cohalan denied the report as "grotesque." Dr. Maloney, who served in the British army and holds the British military cross, declined to discuss the reports.

## FILMS SHOWING WOMEN CIGARETTE USERS BARRED

LYNN, Mass., Oct. 17.—Mayor Ralph S. Bauer, today banned the exhibition in local theatres of motion pictures showing women or girls smoking cigarettes. The mayor recently caused to be removed a bill poster advertising cigarettes which depicted a sailor and a young woman enjoying a smoke. Even more recently he put a taboo on bare knees and issued an edict against automobile sheiks and philandering husbands.
