

Copco Starts Reconstruction of Glendale's Power Distribution System

SURVEY BEGUN FOR NEW POLE LINES TO ALL PARTS OF CITY

Actual Work of Placing
Poles and Stringing Wire
to Commence Within
Next Two Weeks.

New Arrangement to Give
Better Service and
Will End Radio
Interference.

GLENDALE, Oct. 17.—The California-Oregon Power company began surveying for the new distribution and street lighting pole lines Monday. The power company will rebuild every line in the city with the exception of the line built through the alley. In the main business section which was rebuilt last fall after the big fire, in addition to rebuilding most of the distribution lines, the street lighting system will also be rearranged and rebuilt. Lorin Schroeder and Jerry Kerr of Medford, employed in the engineering department of the power company, are here now making surveys. A crew is expected here in about two weeks to commence actual work. Rebuilding of the distribution lines within the city should eliminate a lot of radio interference and better radio reception, according to Grover Medley, radio interference investigator and trouble man for the power company, who was in Glendale from Medford Monday. The radio fans here have been troubled with some sort of intermittent radio interference of late and Medley arrived here for the purpose of running this trouble down, if possible. But like the kid with a toothache on seeing a dentist's office, the radio interference faded to but in its appearance while Medley was here.

Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Beloit left for Portland Tuesday on a brief business trip. They expect to return Thursday.

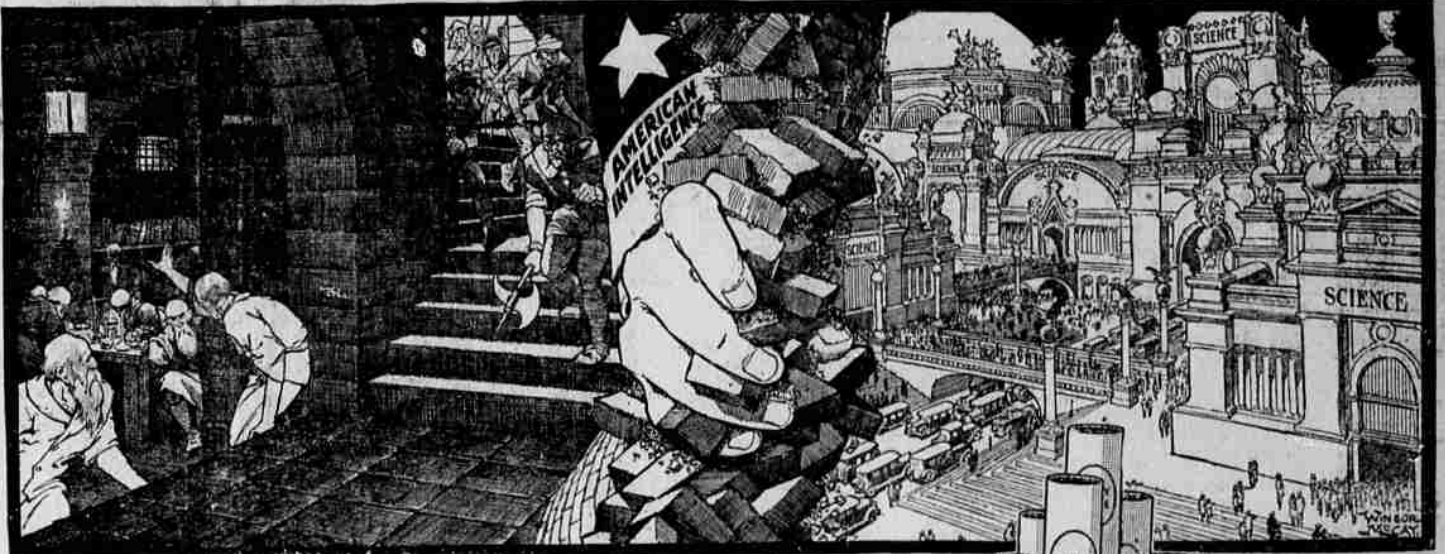
