BAGSHAW EXPECTED TO QUIT SOON AS HUSKIES' COACH. SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 21.—The Post Intelligencer said today that Enoch Bagshaw may resign soon as head football coach for the University of Washington Huskies.

The newspaper said that defeats by Southern California and Washington State college, together with the tie game with Montana, brought football matters to a head. The Post Intelligencer said that after the game with Washington State Saturday, the Huskies lost 20 to 13, a conference was held between Bagshaw's advisers and student body heads. The student board of control sought Bagshaw's resignation last winter.

The newspaper said that some of the coach's friends advised him to resign and then offer his services for the rest of the season because of the difficulty of obtaining a new coach on short notice.
