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5 ALIENS BECOME

CITIZENS OF U. S.

Five aliens were admitted to citizenship today following examinations conducted before Circuit Judge J. W. Hamilton. The examinations were directed by Russell L. Rankin, naturalization examiner. Two women, both native Oregonians, were among those admitted, having lost their original citizenship by marriage to aliens. Following the admissions, representatives of the Daughters of the American Revolution presented a ceremony, each of the new citizens being presented with a small silk flag.

A large group of high school pupils from all over the county were present, witnessing the event as a part of their work in civics.

Those admitted and the countries to which they formerly owed allegiance were Paige Walter Henry, Canada, and Lillian W. Henry, both residents of Roseburg; Lillian Flinn Nappi, Finland and Emma Esther Nappi, resident of Reedsport, and Tom Louis Soterion, Greece, a resident of Reedsport.

THREAT LETTERS SENT TO MURDER TRIAL JUROR

CHICAGO, Oct. 22—Police guard was stationed today at the home of Henry Jonassen, a juror in the murder trial of "We Willie" Dooody, sometimes called "Baby Face." Letters threatening the juror's life unless he does "what is right" by Dooody were received at the Jonassen home yesterday.

Two letters signed by "the forty-two boys" were turned over to police by Jonassen's sister, Jeanette. One was not divulged.

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
