ATHLETICS KNEW SIGNALS OF CUBS. DYKES DECLARES

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 23.—Joe McCarthy, manager of the Chicago Cubs, was amused today over a statement by Jimmy Dykes, third baseman of the Philadelphia Athletics, that the Athletics knew all the Cubs pitching signals in the world series.

"If my men knew what the pitchers were going to throw they'd made so many runs in the very first inning they'd have to get an eviction order to put the side out," said McCarthy. "Any ball player or one who knows baseball will laugh. It's too ridiculous."

Dykes told the Delaware county real estate board at luncheon: "When one of our batters got on base, he would fix his eyes on Taylor, the Chicago catcher, who at times was careless. The runner would stand in a perfectly natural position until he caught the signal, then he would move his hand in such a way that the batter was informed what kind of a ball was about to be pitched, or else a man near the batter would catch the runner's signal and relay it to the man at the plate."

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EX-SENATOR LEWIS THINKS PEACE PLAN DIPLOMATIC TRAP

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 23.—The promise of maritime nations to reduce their navies is but a "brandish of international courtesy," former United States Senator James Hamilton Lewis of Illinois told the United Rotary open meeting held here today in conjunction with the American War association.

Naval limitations conference means little, he said, because "the next war will be by air and chemicals" and navies will not be important.

"Only actions of the people of the nations make for an understanding of the needs of each other, then comprising the grievances felt by the citizenship of one country against the citizenship of another can assure us against war," he said.

"Past experiences will teach us that diplomats and statesmen will agree to anything that serves the political issues today. Mankind has lost confidence in the pretenses of politics because tricked too often to destruction by the deception of diplomats."

"Let there be an end to the service of political exigencies that make only moving pictures of ambitious statesmen and titles, little talks of international delegates pledged to treat each other by the pretense of peace."

He said the recent conversations of President Hoover and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald mean nothing without approval of their people "and these people have seven times been living with the peace treaty and the league of nations, refused approval of their diplomats."

"First let the people of the nations discern of hatred, then arms of war will disarm themselves."
