ALEX PANTAGES CASE DEFENSE COMES TO END

his trial in superior court on a statutory charge.

Pantages, who was on the stand nearly all of yesterday, dramatically told his story on direct examination and repeated it under preliminary cross examination by prosecution attorneys. His testimony was an emphatic denial of the charges brought against him by Miss Pringle, and was in effect a counter charge that the girl was the aggressor.

As Pantages Tells It

The theatre manager testified that on August 23, the date of the alleged attack, the girl insisted on a private conversation with him against his desire, owing to a previous appointment. He testified that he told the girl to go back to his office and he would talk to her, but she said she wanted to see him privately where they would not be interrupted. He then took of trying the door to the little conference room on the mezzanine floor, near which they were standing and finding it unlocked they went in.

He said that after entering the room the girl removed her coat. His own coat, he said, he had removed before he entered the room, contradicting previous testimony of Miss Pringle that he had asked her permission to take it off during the conference. They sat in chairs facing the office door, which Pantages said, was open about fifteen inches.

"I looked at the lady and I said 'go ahead, Miss Pringle, tell me the important business which you have to tell me, and whatever you do don't tell me about your act'."

"What did she say," asked Gilbert.

"She hesitated."

"What was her appearance insofar as being nervous and excited?"

"She was very, very nervous and excited."

Pantages said he then requested the girl to hurry as he was anxious to get home.

"You know what I want," he testified Miss Pringle said. "No I don't know what you want," he replied, "you go ahead and tell me."

Alleges "Fake" Attack

With that, he testified, "she reached over and grabbed my tie. I didn't have any vest on."

"He said they both jumped to their feet and the girl slammed the door shut. He attempted to open the door and a scuffle followed during which he said he tried to eject the girl from the room. He testified that the girl started screaming as he pushed her from the office, and then she ran screaming down the stairs."

The transcript shows that Pantages answered "absolutely not" to eighteen questions put to him by Attorney Gilbert that covered Miss Pringle's description of what occurred to her in the little room, denying each allegation made by his accuser.

Denies Vital Points

He denied that he asked Roy Keene, one of his employees, to move a desk into the conference room following the alleged attack; he denied that he negotiated with Jay Sheridan, San Diego sports man, for the latter to give false testimony at the trial as was related from the witness stand by Sheridan. He also denied that he had asked any of his employees to make false statements to the district attorney regarding the affair.

Skit Held "Vulgar"

The principal development in cross examination was the introduction of a copy of the vaudeville skit that Miss Pringle alleged she was trying to look over the 'antiques' circuit at the time of the alleged attack. Pantages had testified on direct examination that he had witnessed a performance of the play and rejected it because he thought it was vulgar. District Attorney Byron Fitts, who conducted the cross examination, frequently demanded to know where in the vulgar play appeared. The witness pointed out many slang phrases and situations which he said were to him suggestive.

Attorney Gilbert re-read the playlet later, and asserted that certain dashes and other punctuation, together with the information that Pantages said Miss Pringle and her fellow players gave the words, accounted for the alleged vulgarity.

Fitts propounded a hypothetical question, wherein Pantages was supposed to have made many statements to police and the district attorney not compatible with his story on the witness stand. Pantages replied that statements attributed to him were "absolutely false."

"It is a statement made up by the officers, if they testify to that effect," he said.

Sentence Postponed

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—Pronouncement of sentence upon Mrs. Lois Pantages, recently convicted of manslaughter, was indefinitely postponed by Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy. An application for probation is being considered.
