Improves Apartment House—George Kohlhaugen has installed a second ray oil burner in his apartment house on Lane and Jackson streets. The entire building is now heated by one method.

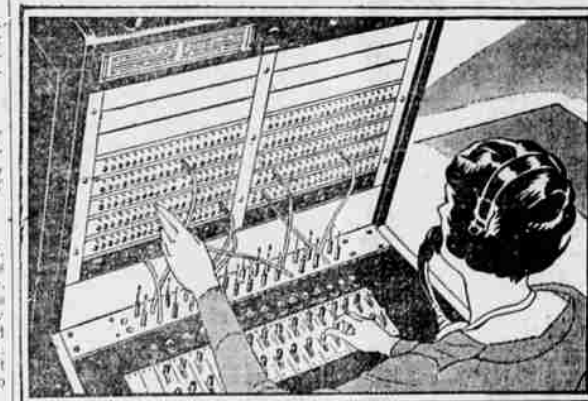

EXPERTS IN CITY AFFAIRS OF OREGON MEET WITH HOSS

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 23.—A uniform system of accounting for Oregon municipalities, which the legislature of 1929 directed Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss to establish will be discussed at a meeting in the hall of representatives today attended by officials from many cities of the state. Tomorrow the league of Oregon cities is to meet here for its third annual convention, opening in the hall of representatives. Addresses will be given by Governor Patterson and Mayor T. A. Livealey of Salem, and Commissioner A. L. Barbour of Portland. Fred A. Williams, city attorney for Salem, will report for the legislative committee, recommending uniform building, plumbing and electrical codes. H. S. Rogers, dean of the school of engineering at Oregon State college, will discuss sewage disposal plants and the recent pollution survey of the Willamette river. J. H. Gilbert and Professor Barnett of University of Oregon will talk on municipal finances and municipal property taxation respectively. Municipal leagues and their benefits will be the subject of a talk by William J. Locke, executive secretary of the league of California municipalities. Secretary of State Hoss will talk on uniform accounting. The league will elect officers.

tion, the report says, tangible proof has been given that the presidents of the country's colleges can stamp out the abuses. Princeton was found to be one of a few institutions which effected arrangements with preparatory schools whereby athletes, varying in number from one to as many as twenty, have been wholly or partly maintained at the schools until they are ready for college. Others named in this connection were Brown, Carnegie Tech, Dartmouth, Dickinson, La Fayette, New York University, Pittsburgh, Syracuse and Washington and Jefferson.

But at Princeton, says the report, the practices referred to have been abolished. At Harvard concessions for the sale of refreshments were found to be allotted exclusively to athletes, but William J. Binham, director of athletics, announced "Plans are at present under way for placing these concessions beyond the control or direct interest of athletes."

Other Colleges Act

Among other instances of improvements were: A letter from President Homer E. Work of West Virginia Wesleyan college announcing that in December, 1928, "all assistance to players was stopped; no scholarships have been provided by the athletic board; no use of the gym as a rooming place, and the training table was discontinued."

nificant and courageous change of policy respecting recruiting and subsidizing. "When, a few years ago, it was discovered that a large proportion of the Tulane football team had been recruited and was subsidized, 17 members of the squad were immediately dismissed from the university. Doubtless this decisive action explains the absence of recruiting now at Tulane."

As to Pennsylvania State college where the investigators found that 75 athletic scholarships were in existence at the time of their visit, President E. D. Hetzel reported: "The board of control passed an action two years ago that no new athletic scholarships should be offered, and none have been offered."
