## BAGSHAW RESIGNS AS WASHINGTON'S FOOTBALL MENTOR

SEATTLE, Oct. 24.—Enoch W. Bagshaw, head football coach at the University of Washington, yesterday submitted his resignation to Earl Campbell, graduate manager.

The resignation was turned in following a long conference by Bagshaw, Campbell and Ward Kumm, Bagshaw's attorney and personal representative in the matter. The text of the resignation addressed to Campbell and signed by Bagshaw, read as follows:

"Kindly accept my resignation as football coach of the University of Washington, effective immediately.

"If it will be of any advantage to you, I will upon your request remain in my present position until the conclusion of the Washington season, which ends with the Chicago game at Chicago, November 25, 1929."

Campbell announced that Bagshaw's offer would be accepted and that he will remain in his present position, assisted by the present Washington staff of assistant coaches.

A new coach will be selected later to succeed Bagshaw at the end of the year.

RUSSIANS SPEND IMMENSE SUM FOR WINE AND VODKA

MOSCOW, Oct. 24.—It takes \$750,000,000 worth of vodka and wine each year to satisfy the thirst of Russia's 146,000,000 people, according to statistics of the Soviet Anti-Alcoholic society. This is more than is used to maintain the Red army and navy, and is said to be equal to the sum invested in developing Russia's heavy industry.

The family of a Moscow laborer

says the society spends an average of \$83 on vodka annually. To every 10,000 population in the Soviet union there is only one club, while there are five wine shops.

Largely as a result of agitation by the society, the government has decided to reduce the output of vodka for the next five years from 277,000,000 gallons to 165,000,000 gallons. The vodka consumers rejoice that they still have a five-year supply of vodka to guzzle.

SMALL FOREST FIRES

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 23.—Two forest fires are reported burning on the Willamette river near Warner mountain, but flames have not under control. A campfire was left burning on the Willamette highway near Lookout some time over the weekend and is being checked.

SANDY, Ore., Oct. 23.—A hundred men were fighting a slashing fire in the Bear creek Logging company holdings today, but officials said there was little danger.

W. A. Sanders, Portland, was taken to a hospital there suffering burns he received while fighting the flames. He was burned about the eyes.

## SONNENBERG WINS HECTIC STRUGGLE WITH OLD ENEMY

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 24.—Some scribes said today Gus Sonnenberg won his wrestling match with Ed "Strangler" Lewis last night, others said Referee Bob McDonald made a most peculiar decision in awarding him the bout, while the camp of Lewis claimed he should have been given the heavyweight championship. McDonald says Sonnenberg is still champion.

The controversy arose over the third fall, which went into records as the second Sonnenberg had won, and came after a double disqualification and a flying tackle which found Lewis facing the wrong direction.

The football-like action which led to the first fall, won by Sonnenberg in 23 minutes, 33 seconds, and the headlocks which squeezed the champion into submission and unconsciousness for the second fall in 14 minutes, 35 seconds, paled before the prelude to the 6 minutes, 20 seconds third fall.

Sonnenberg found Lewis educated to the ways of flying tackle, and in possession of a defense in the form of a straightarm. The tactics missed repeatedly. Finally Lewis straightened Sonnenberg out of the ring, and the champion finished a flying tackle on his face in the press box. He remained there for 17 seconds, and Dr. P. A.

Millikan, his second, rushed to him. This action was sufficient to disqualify him. Lewis' seconds, however, apparently believing the match over, dashed to the side of their minion, and McDonald ruled both sides offside, and no default. He said further that Sonnenberg stuck a foot between the ropes at the count of 20.

The champion lunged at Lewis before the latter had time to recover his composure at the unexpected decision, and felled him. It was the end. J. Sandow, the contender's chief second, protested vigorously for Lewis, and still was protesting when the crowd had gone.

NEAR BLIND YOUTH WINS PRAISE WITH EXPERT CARVINGS

NEWKIRK, Okla., Oct. 24.—Near blindness is no barrier to art. For Clyde Rosell, 29-year-old sheep herder, dexterous finger tips have done what eyes never could do.

His wood carvings have brought unstinted praise from critics. A boyhood pastime of whittling has become bread and butter to this youth who studies the Bible through a magnifying glass.

Biblical characters are the principal subjects of his carvings. Indian scenes, also favorites, have brought many sales to wealthy red-men.

Life held little promise for Clyde after a dynamic explosion blinded him at the age of eight. Soon, however, he discovered his whittling talent would bring spending money.

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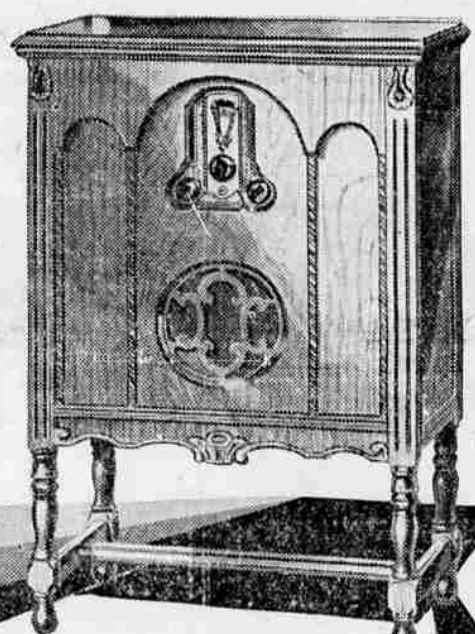

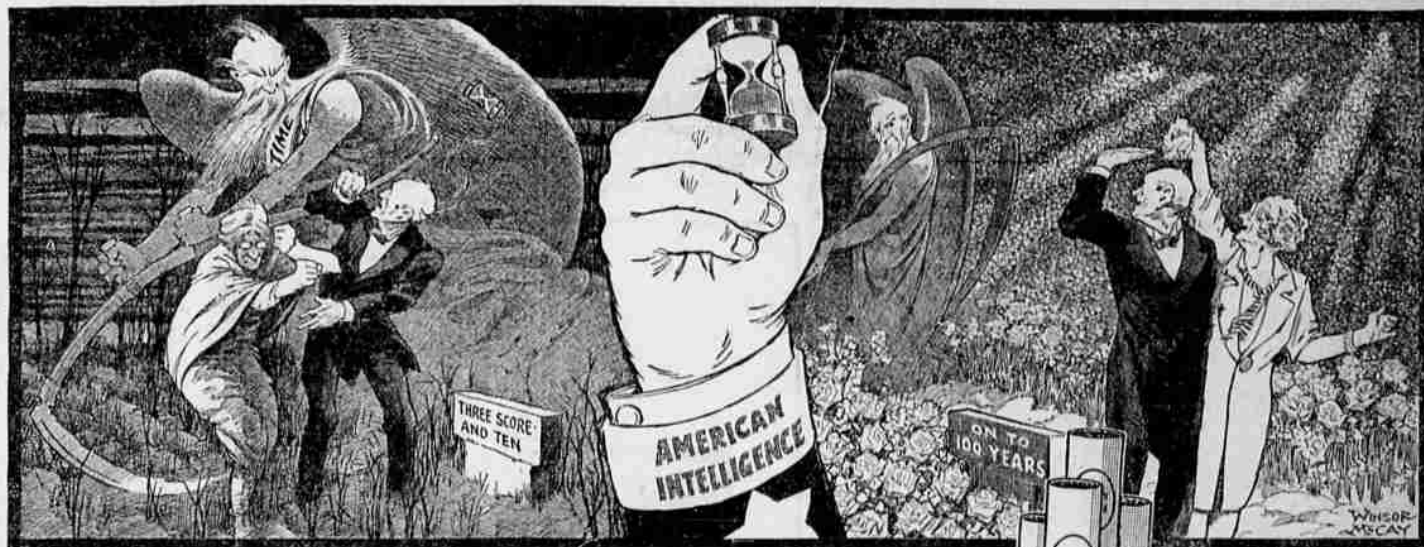
