PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—While the stock market was prospecting about in fantastic fashion, the fruit and vegetable markets were marking time, undisturbed in prices.

Butter and eggs remained firm with any indication of decreasing prices.

Cauliflower Wanted
PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—Increased eastern demand for Oregon cauliflower is the outstanding feature of the market, according to the daily market news letter of the United States bureau of agriculture. It says:

"Cauliflower practically through shipping. Oregon is supplying nearly one-half of the nation's earliest movement of cauliflower. Quality is excellent and early sales made are around \$1.50 per crate, a 25c advance over previous prices."

This advance was not reflected in the Portland market, probably because of the large volume of offerings of No. 2 quality.
