GLENDALE CITY ELECTION TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 5

Citizens' Ticket Filed With Recorder Comprises Only List of Active Aspirants
Present Mayor, Treasurer and Recorder Are Candidates for Re-election—New Council.

(News-Review Douglas County Special)
GLENDALE, Oct. 28.—The expiration of the time for filing of petitions for the nomination of candidates to be voted on at the city election to be held in Glendale Tuesday, November 5, found only one ticket filed with Recorder William R. Leach. This will be the only ticket printed on the official ballot and if there are any other aspirants for any of the city offices it will be necessary for their friends to write their names on the ballots in order to vote for them.
The ticket filed with Recorder Leach is entitled the "Citizens' Ticket" and lists the following nominees:
Mayor for the term of two years, J. H. Brown; treasurer for the term of one year, L. C. Normandy; city recorder for the term of one year, W. B. Leach; councilman, first ward, two-year term, J. Elmer Nelson; councilman, first ward, one-year term, Chas. R. Austin; councilman, second ward, two-year term, C. S. Henninger; councilman, third ward, two-year term, Emmet Helcher.
The nominees on the Citizens' Ticket for mayor, treasurer and city recorder are the present incumbents of those offices. The present councilmen for the first ward are Gilbert Olson, whose two-year term expires, and W. R. Stevenson who is serving as an appointed councilman to fill out an unexpired term. In the second ward J. O. Lyttel is also an appointee as a councilman whose term expires at this time. In the third ward a councilman for two years is to be voted on to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of A. M. McFarland who recently moved to California.

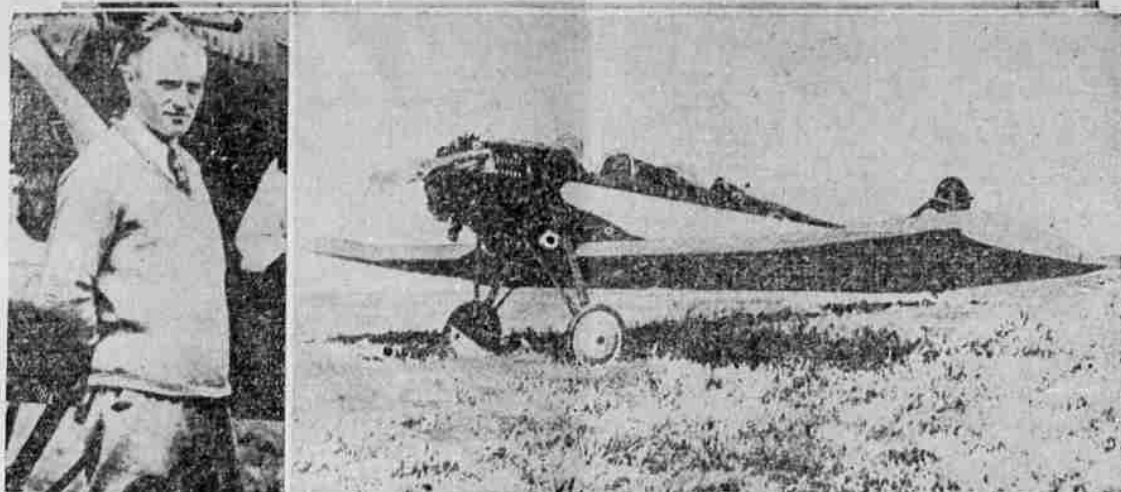

Man and Airplane Believed Lost in Attempted Trans-Atlantic Hop



Picture shows Urban F. Dittman, Jr., and his low winged monoplane, the Golden Hind, in which he attempted to fly the Atlantic. The hopoff was made October 22, from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, with an utter absence of advance publicity, and almost nothing was known of Dittman's plans. Mrs. Dittman, in Billings, Mont., seemingly was the only person beside the pilot who knew of the adventure. The plane carried 165 gallons of gasoline and was equipped for over seas navigation. Dittman's destination was London, a flight of approximately 2550 miles. Dittman has not been seen or heard from since he started. Dittman carried \$40,000 in short time insurance with a Kansas City company.

SCHOOL ELECTION GLENDALE NOV. 16

GLENDALE, Oct. 28.—Notice of a school meeting for the Glendale district, has been given by Carl J. Sether, district clerk to be held Saturday, November 16, for the purpose of discussing the school budget for the ensuing year and to vote on proposition of levying a special district tax.
The Glendale schools, including both high school and grade schools, will cost this district approximately \$26,350.00 this ensuing school year, according to estimates prepared by Mr. Sether, district school clerk. Of this amount \$1225.00 is used to pay interest on bonded indebtedness, which is \$24,500.00 at this time, and \$3500.00 is being used to pay principal on this bonded indebtedness. It will cost the school district approximately \$21,600.00 for direct school expenses such as superintendent and teachers' salaries, supplies, janitor service, insurance, petty miscellaneous and transportation. To haul the children to and from school over three bus routes is costing the district about \$3200 this year.
In order to conduct the Glendale schools efficiently and keep them at a high standard the taxpayers of this district pay approximately a 9 mill school tax. This means that on each \$100 of assessed valuation Mr. Taxpayer pays about 9c towards the upkeep of the local schools, and on each \$1000 of assessed valuation the school tax amounts to approximately \$9.00.

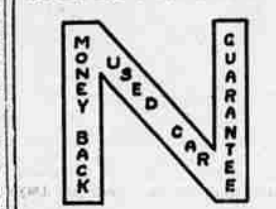
