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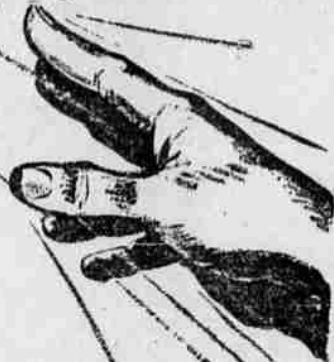

JURY OVER 53 HOURS COMING TO DECISION

he would "fight it out" to the finish.

Mrs. Lola Pantages, wife of the convicted man, confined to her home suffering from shock and illness as the result of her conviction September 21 on a manslaughter charge for the death of Juro Rukunono in an automobile accident, broke into tears when told of the verdict. She made no statement, however, and her physicians said she was in a serious condition. She is at liberty under \$50,000 bail pending a hearing on her appeal for probation.

Miss Pringle "Glad"

Miss Pringle, likewise, was not in court when the verdict was read. Reached in her room in a downtown hotel where she has lived with her mother, Mrs. Lewis Pringle, during the trial, the girl expressed satisfaction over the verdict and recommendations of the jury.

"I am very glad of the result, and so glad that the whole sordid thing is over," she said. "I have felt all alone that only a verdict of guilty could be returned. I told the truth on the witness stand, and feel that I did my duty."

Apparently much dejected, but silent at first, Pantages received the verdict with hardly a quiver of emotion. An adopted daughter, Mrs. Dixie Martin, fled from the courtroom to the refuge of the adjoining prisoner's room, with her hands to her face.

While the theatre man blanched at the verdict read in solemn tones by the court clerk, a few moments later he walked unaided to the prisoner's room. His two sons, Rodney and David, who were in the courtroom to hear the verdict accompanied him. There his daughter, Corinne, who had remained in the prisoner's room, and Mrs. Martin broke into moaning and unrestrained weeping.

None Flee Acquittal

After the jurors were discharged, at the hotel where they had been kept behind locked doors and under guard since the start of the trial Oct. 1, they disclosed that they had been unanimous for conviction from the outset of the first ballot Friday night. Mrs. Christine Titch said that the disagreement of nine to three had been only on the degree of punishment, which they were obliged to fix at either the state's prison term or a one year county jail sentence. The first appearance of the jury in the courtroom came Sunday morning, when

they returned for the re-reading of the trial testimony of Eunice Pringle and three physicians who had examined her four days after the attack. Nearly all of Sunday was spent in this re-forming jurors who retired for their final and convicting ballot at eight o'clock in the evening.

Pantages Complains

In his cell, Pantages told newspapermen "I got a raw deal. I didn't have a chance with the jury. They were against me from the beginning. Looks like a man didn't have a chance when a woman tries to frame him as I have been framed. But don't you think I am beaten. I have told my lawyers to take this case to the highest court in America if necessary to get a reversal."

Pantages Worries

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28.—Hinged from a sleepless night, Alexander Pantages, theatre multi-millionaire, convicted last night of a statutory offense against Eunice Pringle, 17-year-old dancer, today followed county jail routine and had plans to carry on his fight for freedom.

At his request a full hospital intern gave him a sleeping potion last night. "But I couldn't sleep—just kept worrying," Pantages said today.

"What did the jury mean by that word 'evidently'?" he asked. "When told that it was an appeal for mercy, Pantages brightened, but became dejected again when he was further explained that the court could but send him to prison for the one to fifty years prescribed by law."

"I got a raw deal," he declared. "The jury shouldn't have convicted a yellow dog on the evidence against me. But I'm going to ask for a new trial and I think I'll get it. If I don't my attorneys are going to appeal. We will win that."

During the morning the man who had made the beginning of a fortune in the resorts of the Yukon was given a bucket and soap and told to clean up his cell. Pantages had been unable to eat jail food, he said, and an orange and apple he had bought from the jail store went untouched.

"Like the old times up in Alaska, here it's a cold winter asked as the theatre magnate mopped. Pantages did not answer."

SENATOR BINGHAM REPLIES HEATEDLY TO HIS ACCUSERS

Alleges Police Methods in Lobby Quiz and Frameup Against Friend of Administration.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Striking back at his accusers, Senator Bingham, republican, Connecticut, contended in the senate today the lobby investigating committee was "unfair" and had used "police court methods" in examining him regarding his employment of an officer of the Connecticut Manufacturers' association to assist him in tariff matters.

The Connecticut senator asserted the committee was "framed against a friend of the administration."

He said one member of the committee had used a member of the capitol police force as a chauffeur to drive him home while the policeman was still drawing government pay.

Senator Blaine, republican, Wisconsin, a former member of the committee, leaped to his feet and insisted that Bingham name the senator.

"It was the senator from Wisconsin," Bingham retorted. "I'll reply in my turn." Blaine shouted as Bingham continued his speech.

Referring to the senate speech Saturday by Chairman Caraway of the lobby committee, Bingham said Caraway had attacked him and the Connecticut association "by innuendo by torturing and twisting of evidence and occasionally by misstatements which were corrected later only by expressions of doubt as to their veracity."

Caraway had argued employment by Bingham of a paid representative of the association was beneath the dignity of the senate.

"I was so amazed by the speech that I was in doubt whether to reply," Bingham said. "I feel now that a reply is due me, due my constituents and due the manufacturers' association."

"I had not supposed there was so much unfairness in a group of senators."

"I had not supposed that for political purposes, in order to damage a New England senator and a friend of the administration, that they would go as far as they did. I was asked one question several times by the same senator in the house, the finishing of the birds so as to have a larger than usual proportion ready by Thanksgiving. The leading pools, and secured many ideas that will be of benefit in handling this year's crop.

No Definite Prices Yet

None of the pools he states, have as yet received any definite data regarding prices. An agreement was reached between the Idaho, Douglas county, and two other western pools, whereby they will cooperate in selling their pool at the same time, making a group of about 40 carloads of birds, which should prove attractive to buyers. Communication will be established for the exchange of information, and the birds will be sold November 4. This arrangement is expected to establish the Thanksgiving market in two high. The government profits for Thanksgiving trade, while in Seattle the per cent will be considerably lower, the pool managers expect.

More Turkey This Year

This year's turkey crop will be about 9 per cent larger than production last year in leading producing states, according to estimates by the bureau of agricultural economics, U. S. department of agriculture. Practically all leading states have increased production this year, but the largest increases are in the eastern and southeastern states where the crop has been small in recent years.

Production has increased this year in the eastern states but increases are less marked than in 1928. The bureau points out, however, that increases in the west

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3 BOY STUDENTS AND GIRL FRIENDS ATTACK VICTIMS

LYNNHURG, Va., Oct. 28.—Three Washington and Lee university students and their college girl companions narrowly escaped death under a fusillade from a shotgun and two revolvers, when they stopped at a filling station on the outskirts of the city last night.

Guss Whitshire, student, was killed and beaten by Garland Falwell, accompanied by Lloyd Goff, according to police who charged Falwell with feloniously shooting the student. Whitshire was picked up by his girl companions who started the car and raced toward town with the victim, while the other boys fled across a field.

The shooter, after raining a volley upon the fleeing boys followed the roadster driven by the girls, and fired upon them, police said.

Officers who arrested Falwell, quoted him as saying, "the girl driving that automobile was the best I have seen, or it might have been different."

Aside from this, police announced he gave no motive for the attack.

Hospital authorities said they thought Whitshire's wounds, about the head and neck, were not of a fatal nature. Falwell was released under \$5,000 bond.

EXECUTION TOLL FOR SOVIET LAWS INCREASED TO 63

Jewish Diamond Smugglers Latest Victims; Grain Burning Brings on Death Penalty.

MOSCOW, Oct. 28.—Two prominent Jewish diamond merchants, Kleiner and Teitz, were executed by a firing squad today for smuggling diamonds out of Soviet Russia.

Their deaths brought to a total of 63 known executions in Soviet Russia in the last four days for various alleged offenses, most of them political.

Opposition to government policies has cost 26 kulaks, or rich peasants, in various parts of Soviet Russia their lives.

Tass, official news agency, today said that a number had been executed after investigation of government agents into enormous difficulties in gathering grain from the peasantry and converting small peasant farms into large collective farms.

The executions are but a few of those carried out to date by the authorities in their determination to fulfill their policies. Notable recently besides these were 14 executed at Rostov-on-Don and 21 at Krasnodar for counter-revolutionary activity.

Of the 26 rich peasants executed 15 met death either for opposing a government project or deliberately burning their grain to prevent the authorities from taking it.

Two priests and two rich peasants were shot at Gorki, where the local cemetery was included in a new government collective farm, for spreading the rumor the government would destroy the graves and close the church. The peasant neighbors of the dead men took several reprisal measures.

In the village of Maly Puzhik, in the same district, two brothers named Korchangi were shot for opposing the establishment of a collective farm by burning their grain and terrorizing local communists.

Death sentences were pronounced yesterday on four members of the Ippolitovsk church, Kim, Moscow province, for "counter-revolutionary activity." Others identified with the church received prison terms.

It was said when government agents attempted to close the church the priest and his assistants rushed to the church and rang the bells. Hundreds of villagers assembled and listened to a speech by the priest which inspired them to attack government representatives and members of local communist organizations.

PANTAGES' EARLY CAREER AND HEART AFFAIR RECALLED

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 28.—Alexander T. Pantages, convicted by a superior court jury in Los Angeles on an assault charge brought by Eunice Pringle, 17-year-old dancer, opened his first two theatres in Seattle in 1902. It was recalled here.

His first venture was a low priced vaudeville house on Second avenue. He opened a second theatre in the district south of Yesler Way, a section of the city frequented by itinerant working men. In the years which followed he ran these theatres into an extensive circuit from which it was said he amassed a fortune of \$15,000,000. He recently disposed of most of his theatres to other interests.

It was in Seattle also that the celebrated breach of promise suit instituted against him by Kate Rockwell was fought out in the courts.

Pantages was married in Seattle to Lois Mendenhall, a violin soloist playing his circuit, who was the defendant in a manslaughter suit which shortly preceded the trial of her husband in the Los Angeles courts.
