TODAY'S MARKETS

PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—Although fresh extra eggs declined two cents at Seattle, in sympathy with the rest of the country, prices at Portland and other coast markets remain unchanged. The better grades of eggs were in demand, and the supply was barely able to hold its own.

Butter prices in the east also have declined, but coast markets were undisturbed. Storage holdings, however, were comparatively large.

Trading at the east side market was brisk in view of the season and the circumscribed variety of products offered. The tomato supply was dwindling down with the price from 20 to 25 cents; cauliflower sells at 65 to 85 cents; potatoes 30 cents; celery 20 to 25 cents; dry onions, \$1.25 to \$1.50; carrots 20 cents; jumbo celery 10c; No. 1, 60c; No. 2, 50c. Colby cheese, \$1.25; cabbage \$1 to \$1.25.

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DANGER IN NEGLECT OF BABY'S EARACHE

Dr. Copeland, Pointing Out the Possibility of Serious Trouble, Urges Mothers Not to Disregard the Warning of Ear-Pains, Common in Infants.

WITH the beginning of cold weather and the greater confinement of children within doors, will come on attacks of measles and scarlet fever. It is not uncommon during an attack of one of these diseases, or for that matter, of any other acute illness in a child, to have an involvement of the ear.

All the infectious and contagious diseases are likely to be accompanied by more or less inflammation of the lining membranes of the nose. The trouble may creep up the passageway from the nose to the ear, and produce inflammation in that organ.

Even though the attack of fever has been very mild and the little patient has been hardly sick at all, there may be serious trouble in the ear. The parent should be on the lookout for trouble in the region, so to report it to the doctor as early as possible.

Sometimes the child seems to be almost or quite well from his ailment, whatever it was. All at once he becomes peevish, cross and irritable, and the fever returns. In such a case there may be extreme restlessness, with the child tossing from side to side. The suffering infant suddenly cries out, uttering a piercing scream. Or the child may begin to cry and continue the weeping for hours.

When there are paroxysms of crying with no apparent cause, in a child who has been sick, do not fail to examine the ear. In many instances it will be found to be the seat of the trouble.

Earache is bad enough in an adult. If you ever had it, you know how terrible it is. It seems as if a red-hot coal were being driven into the brain.

If you suffered this way after you grew up, think of a little child having such a symptom. You can well understand why it cries out in agony.

Have you ever thought how near the ear is to the brain? Back of the ear and opening into the middle ear are honeycomb-like cavities in the bone. These spaces, known as the "mastoid cells," are very near to the inner surface of the skull. Resting on this table of bone is the brain itself, separated from the mastoid cells by a layer of bone, sometimes no thicker than a sheet of paper.

If the nose and ear contain fluid teeming with pus-producing germs, we have the nucleus for serious trouble. The germs creep into the bone cells I have mentioned. Pus forms so rapidly that it cannot drain away. In such a case the bony wall may be broken down and the brain itself is bathed in pus.

Dear in mind that you must not neglect baby's running ear, or any body's running ear for that matter. The ear is too close to the brain to be overlooked. All ear symptoms demand a consultation with your family doctor. He will advise as to what should be done.

Earache is such a common thing among children that we are apt to grow careless about it. It is wise to disregard the warning. Do not neglect to give it the attention it deserves.
