SENATOR BURTON OF OHIO, LONG IN PUBLIC LIFE, DIES

determination to remain out of politics after his defeat in 1910 as the republican gubernatorial nominee, was making his successful bid for the presidency.

As it turned out, Harding entered the White House and Burton again became a member of the house where he had served eight terms, part of the time being one of its most powerful leaders on chairman of the rivers and harbors committee.

Important Work Abroad

Aside from his more than a quarter century of service in congress, Burton had a conspicuous part in the nation's international affairs. He held a number of important assignments on missions abroad, headed the American delegation to the 1925 Geneva arms traffic conference, and as a member of the American debt commission took an active part in the funding of the large war-time obligations due the United States.

He was born at Jefferson, Ohio, December 20, 1851, the son of the Rev. William and Elizabeth Burton, and was christened Theodore Elijah. He attended Grinnell college in Iowa for a while, was graduated at Oberlin college in 1872, and received a master's degree three years later. Subsequently he was given honorary degrees by Oberlin, Dartmouth, Ohio university, St. Johns, Maryland, and New York university.

After teaching three years at Oberlin, he took up the practice of law in Cleveland. He never married.

BLIZZARD ON EAST SLOPE OF CASCADES

GOLDBLATT MISHAP THEORY ACCEPTED

NORTH ROSEBURG WOMAN STRUCK BY MOTORCYCLE

Mrs. F. E. Erickson, of North Roseburg, received minor injuries yesterday evening when she was struck by a motorcycle driven by Jarvis Robertson. The accident happened on Winchester street near the intersection with Jackson. Mrs. Erickson was crossing the street in front of Robertson, who was descending the hill on his vehicle and hesitated as the motorcycle rushed her. She was knocked down, sustaining bruise on the face, and a cut on her arm.

ing proposing radical revision of the federal reserve law and prohibition of loans by banks for speculative purposes, said a large percentage of money advanced to brokers came from banks outside New York, who would lose tremendous amounts of money if prices for stocks continued to go down.

He added that what he described as the "panic in Wall street" might lead to a "general business panic" of far reaching consequences.

The present situation, he said, would accelerate enactment of a bill by Senator Glass, Democrat, Va., to tax stock sales and a resolution by Senator King, Democrat, Utah, proposing a sweeping investigation of the whole financial situation.

Democratic Jobs
SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Oct. 29.—"Will they blame the stock market on the democrats?—Al." Such was the ironic message sent by Alfred E. Smith to a meeting of the western Massachusetts democratic club last night. The message was enthusiastically applauded, coming after Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York, had declared that if such a market debacle ever took place in a democratic administration it would immediately be halted as the result of business hanging by the party in power.

One Firm "Broke"
NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—The first casualty of the current break in the market was the firm of John J. Bell and company, which was suspended from the New York curb exchange for failure to meet its engagements.

The Bell firm was not engaged in a general commission business, although John J. Bell, a floor trader, is reported to have handled accounts for several of his friends.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—Transamerica broke 32 3/8 points on the opening sale of 3700 shares. 17,500 shares being offered at 9:50 this morning after trading had been suspended 50 minutes to allow bookkeepers to handle the enormous volume of selling orders.

Transamerica in 20 minutes had climbed to 47 as support came in to the market and 10,000 shares changed hands. The support was attributed to an appeal by (Glenn) to his friends and to his stockholders to buy the stock on its investment character which, he said, was unimpaired by the stock market calamity.

Other stocks which tumbled precipitately included Caterpillar, down nine to 52, Standard Oil of California, down nine to 56, Union Associated, down four to 42, Pacific Lighting, down ten to 72, and Bank of California, which dropped 35 points on a small turnover to 315, and Paraffin down 21 to 45.

Glenn Explains
The decline today in quotations on stock of Transamerica corporation was met with the following statement from President A. P. Glenn:

"The fact that Transamerica was the last stock to resist the present market decline affords fair appraisal of its investment value, but with the change in the general trend, it should not be surprising that Transamerica eventually followed the other leading stocks of the world.

COMPENSATION LAW CHANGE FAVORED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29.—A general readjustment of the workmen's compensation act, affecting more than 100,000 workers and 16,000 contributors, was recommended today by the legislative interim committee meeting here.

Appointed by Governor L. L. Paterson, the committee of 15 declared that while the law was one of the most satisfactory pieces of Oregon legislation, economic changes demanded a general readjustment of benefits.

The committee, which was drawn from employers, labor organizations and representatives from the state at large, announced its intention of undertaking a statistical survey of the situation in conference with officials of the state accident commission.

WOMAN, 90, THANKS IN DANISH FOR BOYISH BOB

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 29.—A boyish bob adorned the head of Mrs. Mary Nelson, 90, today.

Two barbers offered complimentary haircuts over the week-end and Mrs. Nelson took advantage of the offer to have her first hair bob. Although she was unable to speak English, Mrs. Nelson, a native of Denmark, thanked the barbers profusely in her native tongue.

Taking advantage of their first breathing spell since early summer, government foresters are now reviewing the costly fire season of 1929. With 5,179 forest fires started in the national forests to date, the year has cost the government \$2,027,390 in fire suppression funds.

A total of 842,000 acres have been burned over within the boundaries of the national forests this year to date. Not taking into account the damage to young tree growth, to watershed protection, or to game and recreation values the loss from fire on the national forests of the Pacific Northwest and inland empire is estimated at \$3,000,000.

\$47,000 OF STOLEN NAVY COIN DUG UP IN CHICKEN YARD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Navy department officials announced today that they had found \$47,000 buried in a chicken yard in southeast Washington by Lieut. Charles Musil, who disappeared from Charleston, S. C., several weeks ago with a \$54,600 payroll.

Lieut. Musil walked aboard the receiving ship Seattle in New York last week and surrendered. He turned over \$15,500 in cash at that time. Officials have little hope of finding the remainder of the money.

Musil told naval officials he had buried the money in the chicken yard located behind a vacant house once occupied by him and his family. Armed with picks and shovels, the officers succeeded in digging up the cash.

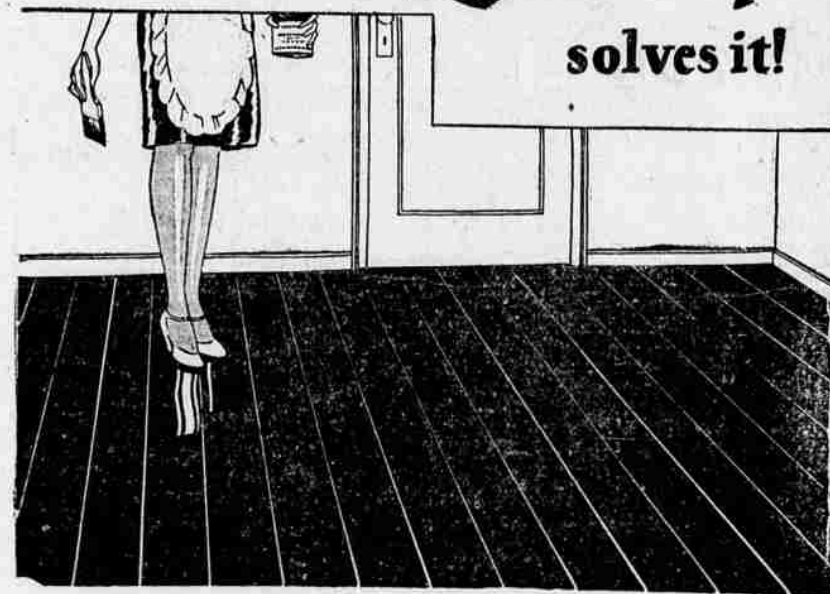
