OREGON FAVORED TO DEFEAT BEARS; NO CHANCE TAKEN

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30.—The University of Oregon football team isn't going to take any chances against the University of California at Los Angeles here Saturday, according to Coach John L. McEwan and the Oregon first string men will go in from the start.

Last year, as at present, Oregon was rated as a heavy favorite over the U. C. L. A. squad, but when the battle got underway the southerners gave Oregon the scare of her life.

This year Oregon is again favored to win easily. But Coach McEwan is going to make sure of it instead of taking chances. Hard scrimmage has been in order during the week for the Webfoot team and the squad is expected to be in good shape.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30.—Following a light signal practice the Bruins of the University of California at Los Angeles planned to depart for Eugene, Ore., today, where they meet the University of Oregon grid eleven in their third conference game of the season Saturday.

Coach Bill Spaulding's team met defeat at the hands of the strong U. S. C. and Stanford combinations, but has turned in victories in three non-conference meetings. In spite of the conceded edge given the Webfoots, the Bruins, primed on Oregon's plays, will seek to upset the northwesterners.

Except for Bob Rasmus, first team end, who is suffering a bad cold, and Don Jacobson, who was injured in the first game of the season, the entire squad will make the journey.

Starting at 7:30 p. m. the "side show" carnival booths will open. Serpentine, carnival hats and horns and other such accessories will lead zest to the occasion. Clowns will frolic and there will be snake charmers, animal show, fortune tellers, and numerous other attractions to be visited.

IRENE BORDONI ACCUSES MATE OF UNFAITHFULNESS

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—The Irene Bordoni-Ray Goetz domestic drama has moved for the moment from New York to Chicago with the French actress seeking in Illinois courts an annulment of her marriage to the Broadway producer. Goetz has filed suit for divorce in New York.

"Miss Bordoni," appearing in a musical comedy, filed the annulment suit yesterday, alleging that the time of her marriage to Goetz, October 18, 1918, in Jersey City, Goetz had been divorced less than a year from his former wife, Mrs. Ethel Goetz.

The first Mrs. Goetz was granted a divorce here in April, 1918. She named Miss Bordoni co-respondent. At the time of the divorce, Miss Bordoni had set forth, an Illinois law prohibited marriage within a year following divorce. This law stood until 1923. It is Miss Bordoni's contention that earlier law makes the second marriage an imperative case for annulment.

Hearing of the petition has been set before Superior Judge Williams next week.

The Bordoni-Goetz troubles became known late last year when Miss Bordoni announced she had left her husband, charging another woman was the reason.

Informed of her husband's conviction on statutory charges brought by Miss Pringle, and although her physicians denied they feared for her life they said that she is in a "very critical condition."

COMBIBORY VACCINATION URGED BY DR. F. N. MILLER

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30.—From advisory association of students at state institutions of higher learning is recommended in a resolution to be presented to the state board of higher education by Dr. F. N. Miller, University of Oregon health service director. A representative two-thirds of the students at the university are vaccinated, Dr. Miller said.

OREGON SPENT BIG SUM ON HIGHWAYS

A total of 29,222 miles of highways on the various state systems was improved during 1928, reports the Oregon State Motor association, which has found that this represents an increase of 2,530 miles over the 1927 figures of 26,722 miles. The 1928 work included 8,675 miles of graded and drained roads and 20,577 miles of new surfacing. There were 13,843 miles surfaced, while 3,587 were of a lower type than that newly applied.

Texas leads in the year's improvement with 2,346 miles. Kansas with 1,785 miles ranks second; Arkansas with 1,573 is third. Iowa improved 1,345 miles and Illinois 1,244 ranking fourth and fifth respectively. Minnesota with 1,243 miles is sixth; North Dakota with 1,230 is seventh; New Mexico with 1,052 is eighth; Kentucky with 1,021 is ninth and Ohio with 928 miles is tenth.

Basing figures on reports of the U. S. bureau of public roads, the Oregon State Motor association finds that:

During 1928, the states spent \$764,648,134 for state highway and bridge work under the supervision of the state highway department, made up as follows: For construction and right of way \$536,254,303; for maintenance \$158,878,739; for equipment and machinery \$20,557,483; for interest on outstanding bonds and notes \$37,637,034, and for miscellaneous expense \$11,332,741.

"The states also paid out \$27,016,499 in retirement of the principal of outstanding bonds and transferred \$25,885,350 to county and town funds for local roads, making a total disbursement of \$827,549,983. At the end of 1928, there was an unexpended balance of available funds amounting to \$250,221,565 for all states."

butantes, teachers and stenographers, have been in the market. The slump which began a week ago and culminated in yesterday's record-breaking crash gave the majority of them their first baptism of fire and wiped many of them out.

During grueling days that have tried veteran operators women have crowded about the tickers and sat before the boards in the offices of their brokers watching the drop of prices that meant to many the loss of years of savings.

Women Hysterical
Brokers said their experiences with women customers during the slump had been varied. The suddenness of the onslaught last Thursday when margins vanished in minutes and many women found themselves sold out caused hysteria and some of them fainted.

Most of those who survived the two previous blows appeared yesterday to have become accustomed to the ordeal. Some even smiled as they watched their fortunes fade.

Many declared they were through playing the market. "As customers women are more uncertain than men. They seek more advice. They sit and murmur, 'Shall I sell or shall I hang on?' They go through greater agony of indecision in crucial moments. In the last week I think they have suffered from the mental strain more than men."

Flings Costly
A great many elderly women have been among the throngs filling the brokers' offices, wealthy dowagers who arrived in cars with liveried chauffeurs and retired school teachers risking their savings on the turn of the market.

Four richly dressed women toured uptown brokerage offices in a party. One of them announced she had lost \$15,000 and led her companions out, remarking: "This place is depressing."

Brokers said the women were

more volatile than men in discussing their losses, confiding to casual strangers what their fling in the market had cost them.

Chicago Stocks Revive
CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—Apparently somewhat recovered from their recent release, prices on the Chicago stock exchange moved generally upward today, although some issues performed irregularly. Cites Service, which had suffered extensively during the last week's debauchery, opened today a half point off at 22 1/2, but gradually climbed up to 23 1/2 during the first two hours.

"Bulls" Recover Ground
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 30.—Stock prices headed higher in San Francisco trading early today as better feeling was manifested along Montgomery street. Buying on the opening sent several issues one to three points above yesterday's close and continued the upward movement during the first hour of trading.

Transamerica, beaten back yesterday after stalling alone against the nation-wide selling drive, led the counter attack, opening nearly two dollars a share higher and gaining ground steadily until more than six dollars ahead of its last night's position.

Trading on the local curb exchange likewise showed a buoyant tone.

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EIGHT AUTOS FOR EACH ROAD MILE

The United States has one mile of highway for every mile of area, and there are nearly eight automobiles for every mile of road in the country, according to figures reported by the Oregon State Motor association.

The United States with 3,905,414 miles of road has a greater total mileage than all of the rest of the world combined. This is given as one reason why there is one automobile in the United States for every five persons. In China, with the largest population of any country in the world, there is one automobile for every 18,744 persons, and that huge empire of the east has only 17,740 miles of road suitable for motoring.
