LUTHERANS WILL MEET IN ROSEBURG AND AT ELGAROSE

Commencing tonight and continuing all day tomorrow the Lutherans of Roseburg and Elgarose will hold a mission meeting. This meeting this evening will be held in the parish hall of the Episcopal church in Roseburg. The services will commence at 7:30. Rev. Eric Wahlstrom, returned missionary from China, serving at the present time as pastor at Warren, Oregon, will give a most interesting account of his experiences abroad. The topic of his address is "Two Years in China". Mrs. Eric Wahlstrom, who accompanied her husband to China, will sing on this occasion. Rev. J. A. Edlund, pastor of Trinity Lutheran church of Marshfield, Oregon, will also be present and speak. He has appeared in a great many churches the last few years and lectured on Reformation. He will give this lecture tonight. Rev. Edlund is a good soloist as well as a speaker and will sing one or two songs.

Friday sessions and sessions will be held all day in the Eden Lutheran church of Elgarose. Services will be held at 10:30 a. m. when Rev. J. A. Edlund, pastor of Trinity Lutheran church of Marshfield, Oregon, will speak and also Rev. Wahlstrom. The Ladies' Aid will serve dinner at noon to all attending. At two o'clock in the afternoon a program will be held at which short addresses will be given by Rev. Andrew G. Anderson of Clatskanie, Oregon; Dr. E. Edman, Rev. Edlund, Rev. Sakrisson and Rev. Wahlstrom. Several musical numbers will also be given by the Mesdames Sakrisson and Wahlstrom. At 7:30 there will be a prayer meeting led by Rev. COMMISSION GOVT. ENDORSED AT BEND

BEND, Ore., Oct. 31.—The new commission form of government received a vote of confidence by the people of Bend as shown in the budget election held here yesterday. The tax levy of \$95,540.50 for 1930 was approved by a vote of more than two to one. Of the 541 votes cast, 385 persons voted for the appropriation, and 156 voted against it.

This was the first budget prepared under the commissioner-manager form of government and was regarded as the first test of the new form, with George Gove, mayor; N. R. Gilbert and J. F. Hosch, commissioners, and C. G. Reiter, manager.

LUMBER MILL NEAR JUNCTION BURNED

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30.—The Horton Lumber and Timber company's sawmill, near Junction City, was destroyed by fire Tuesday night. Only a planer was saved and about a half million feet of clear lumber was burned. The loss is partially covered by insurance.
