The real stars don't change their places at all. That is why they're called fixed stars. They're fixed in the sky. Of course, they march across the sky from night to morning, but they all march together, like a row of soldiers. They never leave their places like the planets do."

"Very large. And it is the strongest planet of all, for instead of one moon it has nine moons."

"Nine?" they all exclaimed.

"Yes, and even more curious. It has a wide ring running all around it which looks like the brim of a straw hat."
