GARDENS—
and Other Things

The Victoria Regia is the most amazing water lily that grows. At Rose National Gardens, London, there is one the leaves of which are six feet and a half in diameter, or twenty-one feet in circumference. They are shaped like the upper crust of enormous pies, the edges crinkled and turned up about six inches, and they will support the weight of a small boy. Every day one of the gardeners goes to put on a bathing suit and wade into the pool to wash the surface of these huge leaves with a sponge.

The question has been asked whether we could raise Victoria Regia here. It could be done, but it is not practical except for public institutions or on the estates of wealthy people. Victorias are growing successfully at St. Louis, Philadelphia and other places in this country. Of course it takes a very large pool, especially prepared, and the water has to be artificially heated. Most of our Roseburg pools would be large enough for about one or at the most, two good Victoria leaves. So, regrettably, we shall have to pass up the Victoria Regia, queen of all two water lilies.

When Henry Ford made the famous, but for him, most unfortunate statement that history was bunk he probably did not mean just what the words seemed to imply. But what he meant was that he did not take the country into his mind that the United States alone would not be a wholly appropriate place for Henry Ford. Strange to say, however, since that time Henry Ford has shown more interest in early United States history than almost any other American, and in a most novel and interesting way.

Some months ago the state treasurer of Massachusetts sent Henry Ford a check for one dollar in payment for a mile and a half of modern highway in Sudbury, passing the Wayside Inn. It cost Mr. Ford \$280,000 to build it. It has a 100-foot right-of-way, 20 foot pavement, 2-foot hard shoulders and 7-foot grass plots on either side. The aim in building this road has been to make it blend in with the beautiful country side and in no way to disfigure it. The Massachusetts department of public works is landscaping this new road, not to make a garden of it but to keep it natural. 6227 trees and plants were set out there this spring and the planting has been made with the idea of having the highway beautiful in winter as in summer—a very important thing for us here to think of when we are planning the landscaping of our Oregon highways.

Our problem in this state is much greater than that of Massachusetts, as our state is greater and our population and resources less. But a real determination to do something has grown up all over the state during the last year. So far the movement lacks leadership. The Garden clubs are ready to go as are many of the service clubs and undoubtedly we shall get organized for aggressive work soon.
