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NEW LAND LEASES PERMIT RENEWAL OF WELL DRILLING

Favorable progress in securing leases on property surrounding Leeper Dome has resulted in resumption of actual drilling, officers of the Oakland Oil company announced today. Control of all of the block of leases has been practically secured, with one possible exception upon which the officers are still working. It is reported, so that it is possible to resume work. Actual signing of all desired leases is expected within a short time.

The drill is being operated on a 24-hour basis, and it is expected to go forward with the work until production has been reached or the prospect exhausted. The finances have been well arranged and it is believed that sufficient money is on hand to carry the work to the necessary depth to tap the oil field that is believed to exist.

The officers and stockholders are greatly encouraged by the fine showing at the well, and express confidence that production will be obtained in the very near future.

P. M. Morgan, who is associated in the enterprise, and who is contributing a large portion of the finances to bring the well to completion, is also very enthusiastic over the situation. Mr. Morgan has had 10 years of experience in the oil business in Kansas and Texas and has been very successful in development of new fields.

He states that he has never seen better prospects for a successful well, as the structure is perfect and the formation is exactly what would be expected, while the constant and increasing gas showing is a very favorable indication of a body of oil at greater depth.

"If this showing is obtained in a proven field," Mr. Morgan stated, "the success of the well would be practically assured."

"Of course, we haven't yet secured an oil well, but I am investing heavily in this property, despite the fact that the only chance to get anything back depends entirely upon reaching production. I consider the well an excellent speculation for anyone who has money to invest on a purely speculative basis. There is, of course, always a chance to lose and no person should invest who cannot afford to take a chance. However, if more funds are needed to complete the well, I am willing, if the present showing continues, to put in my proportionate share."

The hole at Leeper Dome is now 2700 feet and is almost filled with water, yet despite the weight of the water, the officers report, gas is still coming out, and the pressure is so strong at the bottom that the bailer comes up only about one-half full.

The drill has not been in operation for a number of months, and the new crew has been busy for the past week cleaning out the hole. The casing has all been freed and actual drilling has now been resumed.
