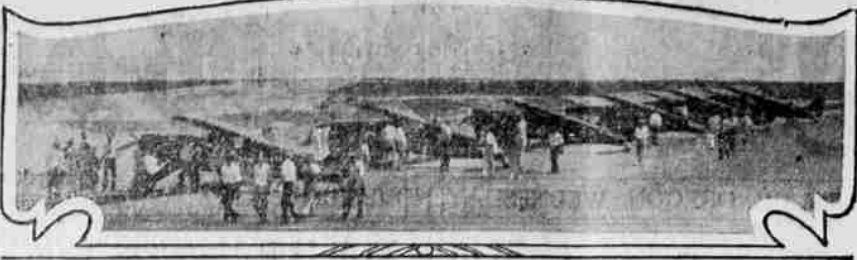

1,500 SHEEP DIE IN FIRE
