IT NEVER PAYS

WE HAD last week the depressing spectacle of a young man just entering the years that should be his years of greatest usefulness and of a girl barely out of high school age being sent to the penitentiary for proved and admitted crime. The young man at 24 was already an ex-convict. He had failed to profit by a first bitter lesson. He still thought he could "beat the game." Not content with making the insane plunge for himself he carried with him into the vortex a girl of but 18 years.

The pair ought to have been able to see how utterly certain would be the end of their crazy career. What they were attempting was foredoomed to failure. They stole a taxicab and impressed the driver into their service. They stole an automobile and dumped its rightful occupants out on the public highway. They proceeded with their wild flight along that highway straight into the waiting arms of the law, forewarned as a matter of course of their coming.

Any young couple of ordinary sense could have foreseen their certain disaster. Were they lacking in that sense or were they utterly reckless and indifferent as to what might happen to them?

The false glitter and glamor of crime make no appeal to the vast majority of our young people. They are normal, and normal people prefer the ways of right for the sake of right. But the few who have a different bent and who are attracted to crime ought to be deterred by the knowledge of this truth: It never pays.

You wouldn't imagine, offhand, that American prohibition would increase the prosperity of certain native chiefs in the interior of Africa. Sometimes it's hard to figure what the ultimate effects of a course of action may be. Surely, no one would have imagined that the passing of the corner saloon would have meant riches for native rulers in distant Africa.

The premiums offered comprise an imposing list and every turkey raiser is pepped up. This will be a real affair and a real fair. Plan to go.
