BOLSHEVISM HAS BIRTHDAY; RUSSIA STAGES JUBILEE

Moscow Sees Military and Civilian Pageant; Meat and Bread at Cost Given People.

Government Recipient of Huge Mass of Products; Religion Scored in Flagrant Style.

MOSCOW, U. S. S. R., Nov. 7.—Communist Russia today observed in traditional revolutionary fashion the twelfth anniversary of the 1917 upheaval which ushered bolshevism into the world and destroyed the ancient Russian government.

To bring the event closer to the hearts, if not to the stomachs, of the people, the government gave bread and meat at cost price to every member of the population holding bread cards.

With the aid of millions of yards of red hunting, huge flaming placards, symbolical wooden floats, numerous speakers' stands, and large portraits of Lenin, Marx and Stalin, historic Red Square has transformed into a mighty theatrical stage for the passing of a twelve-mile long military and civilian parade led by the commander of the Moscow garrison.

Favored by perfect weather this singing, shouting mass of humanity, carrying banners, flaming flags and chanting the international, marched through the gates of resurrection where formerly stood the famous chapel of the Siberian virgin. Over the portals of the gates today appeared a gigantic red anti-religious placard reading: "Down with the recit of popes! Give us books instead of religions!"

Allegorical floats satirizing capitalism and imperialism and glorifying the triumph of communism and labor were a distinctive part of the procession which required eight hours to pass.

The marchers were reviewed by such leading figures as Joseph Stalin, Alexei Rykov, Mikhail Kalinin, Clemence Voroshilov, A. Mikoyan and others who stood on a red draped wooden platform erected around a bronze monument to Prince Pozharski and Kizma Minin who freed Russia from the Poles early in the seventeenth century.

Gifts From Workmen
While Kremlin batteries boomed out successive salutes to the October revolution, workmen's delegations from various parts of the soviet union presented trainloads of iron, steel, coal, grain potatoes and textiles as gifts to the government.

On hundreds of banners carried by manifestants were slogans and catchwords directed in favor of the government's five-year industrial stabilization plan and against Leon Trozky, Bucharin and other members of the opposition.

Throughout the day all shops, factories and government bureaus were closed, street traffic was suspended and everybody was given a holiday. Tonight all big cities throughout the soviet union will be ablaze with electric lights and fireworks. Special revolutionary performances will be given in the theatres, cinemas and clubs without admission fee. One of the features will be a soviet talking picture.

In a long signed article in today's Izvestia, Stalin sounds a note of optimism and triumph. He states that the great growth of collective farms will enable the soviet government finally to emerge from the present grain crisis and predicts that within a few years Russia will become one of the greatest grain and industrial producing countries in the world.

ART GOEBEL, NOTED FLIER, HAS CLOSE CALL IN "STUNT"

LONG BEACH, Calif., Nov. 7.—A minor accident to the stunt plane of Colonel Art Goebel, noted pilot, today nearly wrecked a nine-year flying record and momentarily endangered Goebel's life.

As the colonel's open cockpit plane executed a barrel roll, 2000 feet above the municipal airport here where a crowd was waiting to welcome a fleet of airplanes, a dry cell battery was dislodged and hit the flier's head.

The plane was flying on its back and the impact dazed the pilot. For a brief few seconds the ship wobbled crazily and then Goebel's head cleared and he brought it to earth safely.

A large gash in his head was dressed and he returned to the air to entertain the crowd. The colonel boasts a record of never cracking up in an airplane in nine years of flying, although he admitted afterwards he was exceedingly dubious of his fate for a few seconds today.

GIRL COMPLAINS SHE WAS CAPTIVE OF PORTLAND GANG

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—Federal authorities today entered the investigation of vice conditions in Portland after Bonnie Fisher, orphaned 19-year-old Canvasser, Ore., girl, told police a sensational story of being held captive three days in an obscure rooming house by an alleged ring of men and women.

Jerry McGuire and Nick Dials were arrested by city and federal officers, while five others are being sought in various portions of the city.

Miss Fisher told police she had been employed in a pharmacy but because of illness was forced to leave her position and enter a hospital. Her money gone, the girl said she sought other work after leaving the hospital and became acquainted with McGuire who, she said, promised to find her employment.

The girl told police that McGuire, under the pretext of employing her as a chamber maid, took her to an obscure hotel where the landlady forced her to undergo numerous insults. She finally escaped from the rooming house, she said, and told her story to a policeman. He took her to the district attorney.

Miss Fisher declared that the landlady of the hotel, who police said they want, tore her clothing from her and hung one crimson garment in the room. The girl was attired in this when she escaped and appealed to the policeman.

WOMAN DEMOCRAT WINS SHERIFF JOB IN G. O. P. COUNTY

Descendant of Robt. E. Lee Avenges Husband, Who Won Primary But Was Ousted.

BARBOURVILLE, Ky., Nov. 7.—A 40-year-old mother of four children will be sheriff of the mountain county of Knox for the next four years.

She is Mrs. Jennie Lee. Mealer Walker, a great great niece of General Robert E. Lee, a democrat, she ran for office as an independent and carried the county, with a majority of 366. Knox county is Governor Flem D. Sampson's home county, and is solidly republican in the ratio of 4 to 1.

Mrs. Walker ran into the race after her husband, B. P. Walker, had won the republican nomination for sheriff by seven hundred on the face of primary returns and then had lost it in a contest suit filed by one of his opponents, Ike Taylor. As soon as the case was decided, she announced her candidacy, running without a party emblem.

The republicans ordinarily have little campaigning to do in Knox county, but Mrs. Walker kept them busy this year as she made her personal appeal to the voters. She said that she has been trained as a bookkeeper and stenographer and is competent to handle the business of the sheriff's office. She promised to appoint honest, efficient and fearless deputies to take care of the law enforcement end of the office.

LIST OF TIMBER OWNERS FIGHTING NO. UMPQUA ROAD

Non-resident timber owners are making a strong battle against the No. Umpqua super road district, boundaries for which are now being considered by the state highway commission following the hearing recently held in this city.

At the time of the hearing a great sheaf of letters was presented to the commission by the secretary, Roy Klein, and the names of the writers were given. The timber owners have organized against the project, and are understood to be supporting much of the agitation throughout the county in addition to their direct letters to the commission.

The state highway commission took the boundary issue under advisement and is going over the testimony and reports presented at the time of the hearing. It reports that letters have been received from the following resident and non-resident timber holders:

A little sign was posted conspicuously: "The laws of Texas do not permit betting on horse races. Kindly cooperate. The Volstead law will be strictly enforced. Texas Jockey club."

Another \$8,000, for six races, is offered in purses today.

HOOVER AIMS AT HIGH STANDARD IN DIPLOMATIC CORPS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—A complete list of new heads of American diplomatic missions in a number of South and Central American countries is expected to be ready for action by President Hoover within a week.

Among those who are reliably reported to be remaining in the South American field are Alexander P. Moore, ambassador to Peru; William S. Culbertson, ambassador to Chile; Robert Woods Bliss, ambassador to Argentina,

and Edwin V. Morgan, for the past seventeen years ambassador to Brazil. George T. Sumnerlin, former minister to Honduras, has already been appointed minister to Venezuela; Leland Harrison, former minister to Sweden, has been appointed minister to Uruguay; and Sheldon Whitehouse, of New York, minister to Guatemala. Henry F. Guggenheim has been named ambassador to Cuba.

President Hoover is known to be keenly interested in the development of the American diplomatic service in the South and Central American areas ever since his Latin American tour of last year, and has been particularly interested in the question of the promotion of career diplomats of the American foreign service to responsible positions.

In the appointment of Sumnerlin and Harrison the president showed an inclination toward the foreign service in his first two choices in the Latin American field. Members of the foreign service have expressed the hope ever since Mr. Hoover came into office that he would see fit to make further promotions to responsible positions for the service.
