GLENDALE BUDGET EXPENDITURES TO BE ABOUT \$9,000

(Associated Press Local Wire)
GLENDALE, Nov. 7.—The Glendale city council held its regular meeting last Monday evening at the city hall with Mayor J. H. Brown presiding.

The annual budget of bills was read and ordered passed. The installation of two 12-inch drain sewers across the city, one each at the 14th and 16th street intersections, was ordered by the council. A street committee consisting of A. O. Clarke, W. L. Joly, H. E. Harvey and R. M. Eberle was appointed to confer with a committee of councilmen consisting of W. H. McPherson, Albert Olson, H. M. Moore and J. O. Lydal to reduce the city budget for the coming year.

The annual average city expenditures are about \$9,000, about 90 percent of which is raised by direct taxation and the balance is mostly derived from water rentals. The city budget figures provide approximately \$2,000 to retire building warrants issued in connection with the construction of the new city hall, \$1,000 applied on sewer bonds of which the city has \$2,000 left outstanding at this time, \$2,500 for water system renewals and extensions, \$1,000 for street work, and the balance of the budget is made up of minor items and amounts such as salaries, fire apparatus, etc.

A citizens' meeting is to be held at the city hall Thursday evening, November 21, for the purpose of examining the budget and voting on same.

CITIES OF OAKLAND AND BERKELEY FREE OF FIERY MENACE

OAKLAND, Nov. 8.—Two fires which carried their way into the outskirts of Berkeley and Oakland where an army of 2,000 firemen and volunteers battled to stem their advance last night, were definitely under control today. A blizzard of rain wind kept 200 men on the alert, however, and hundreds more were on call should an emergency arise.

One of the fires, starting yesterday afternoon, near San Pablo dam, transformed Wildcat canyon into a roaring inferno which reached the city limits of Berkeley before it was checked.

The second fire burst out on a tunnel road into the Berkeley blaze and at its height. When the apparatus arrived, the blaze had made such headway that it was impossible to reach the fire. The Pacific Gas and Electric company and east bay utility district power houses.

When the Berkeley fire broke out, Fire Chief George Haggerty, fearing a repetition of the disastrous blaze of 1923, sounded a general alarm. Students and professors from the University of

California, Boy Scouts, municipal employees and other citizens rushed to the aid of the city firemen and batties finally were checked after a stubborn fight.

As a result of the fires, the tunnel road into Berkeley and Oakland was temporarily closed.

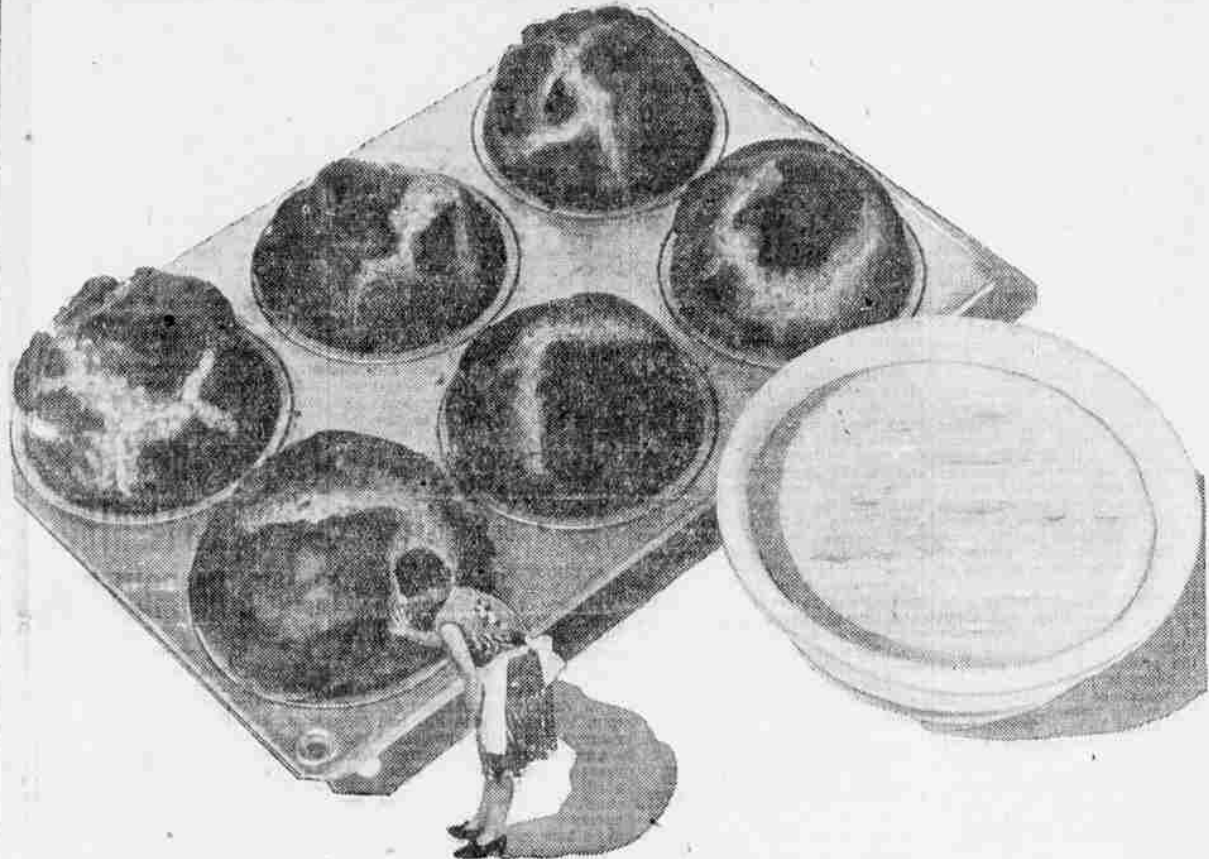
THREE CHILDREN DIE IN FIRE THAT RAZES HOME
