ARMISTICE DAY—1918-1929

ELEVEN years ago today, the guns that for four years had clamored their dreadful chorus from the North Sea to the Swiss Alps, were silenced. The greatest war of all history, a vast and desperate struggle reaching to the roots of human life, had come to an end.

We, with other peoples, had made a solemn sacrifice for the amelioration of the world and each passing year has brought a deeper appreciation of the nobility and significance of that sacrifice.

No words we speak, no monuments we build, can pay adequate tribute to the devotion, the heroism and endurance of those who gave their lives and all that life means in order that we might achieve victory, but as each succeeding November brings another Armistice day we keep faith with them by reconsecrating ourselves to the establishment of lasting peace.

Since we celebrated this day of human triumph a year ago much progress has been made along definite lines to insure international amity. The outlawry of war and the proposed disarmament conference are palpable evidence that we stand with all our moral and material strength on the side of peace.

We are true to our trust with the dead and as, with the coming of this day, we look backward down the lengthening vista of the years, we gratefully remember their heroic spirit and derive new inspiration and courage to meet our obligations as beneficiaries of their sacrifice.

JANE ADDAMS LEADS THE WAY

This news item came recently from Chicago:
"Mrs. Olympia Myhrman, who has been called the 'Swedish Jane Addams' for her work in helping many Swedish people to get a start in the United States, was given a banquet by her friends here in appreciation of her long years of service."
"Coming to this country at the age of 16, with no knowledge of English and with no money, she struggled along doing housework which paid her 32 a week with room and board. After acquiring the language, she found other work and later, in 1893, when the Swedish National Association was formed, became its secretary."
"Some 200,000 Swedish men and women were given work during her 18 years' management of the free employment bureau of this organization. Many personal sacrifices were made to help not only Swedish laborers but also Swedish artists. Many times Mrs. Myhrman has paid rent of half for the benefit of Swedish artists."

"She has been twice decorated by King Gustave in recognition of her work in helping Swedish immigrants to get established in America. In 1921, she organized the American Daughters of Sweden."

Germicides and Infections

FROM the time it was discovered that germs cause many diseases, every effort has been made to find a means of killing them.

This was not difficult, but how to get rid of the germs without damaging the tissues of the body, was an entirely different matter.

We have a few notable examples of what can be accomplished in this direction. The treatment of malaria is one such.

Malaria and its exhausting symptoms can be traced to the presence in the blood of certain microscopic organisms. Quinine, a chemical product of cinchona bark, is capable of killing these parasites. It is true that quinine can destroy the cells of the body, too, but its appetite is better satisfied by the germs of malaria. It is like several other chemicals—it has selective powers and will feed upon one sort of living tissue in preference to another. So the quinine attacks and kills the germs of malaria, leaving the human cells undamaged.

Remarkable progress is being made in the escape from and control of blood poisoning. The uncomfortable and possibly serious condition is due to infection with one or more of the pus-producing germs.

If you are in good health and vigor, a cut or pin-prick is quite unlikely to do any harm. But if you happen to be a bit under par, the germs which enter your wound are exceptionally active, there may be local infection. That is, the tissue around the wound will be swelling, redness and pain, confined to the immediate neighborhood of the injury. This may result in little more than a pimple.

A more serious infection is shown by a spreading of irritation and inflammation. Starting with a pin-prick and swelling of the finger, the whole hand and arm may become involved.

There is yet another complication. When the poison gets into the blood, causing a general poisoning of the system. This is known as "blood poisoning," or "septicemia." It is a serious condition.

A "escape germs" if you can. Make such local applications as will kill the germs of pus formation, without damage to the cells of the tissues.

This is the time to apply a "germicide," a local application, which has an appetite for germs and will not damage the skin and other tissues. Iodine and mercuriochrome are the popular ones.

Health Bulletin

Water for Domestic Purposes

Important advances have been made in our knowledge of the treatment of water for domestic purposes. Water-borne diseases have been greatly lessened through modern methods of sanitation and sterilization. A new method has recently been developed for the sterilization of water which may prove to be an advance beyond those now in use. The sterilization is dependent upon very finely divided catalytically-active metals, preferably silver. It is claimed that water filtered through such material is sterilized by electric action, but not a great deal of work is in operation no further attention is required. There is no impairment of odor or flavor.

Equipment for the sterilization of small quantities of water for household use has made steady progress. Bacterial filters may be effective for a time, but become a source of danger. Purification of water by ozone has often been attempted, and an ozonizer for deodorizing air has recently been developed that operates on current from an ordinary house circuit.

In Germany, a household water sterilizer has just appeared that subjects a film of water, flowing between two concentric quartz tubes, to the action of the ultraviolet light of a mercury arc lamp that surrounds the tubes. At a reasonable rate of flow the lamp remains cool and the water is able to be completely sterilized.

More attention is constantly being given to methods for treating water on a large scale to remove its tendency to corrode iron pipes. One of the most promising of these consists in making sure that the water as it enters the mains has the very slight degree of alkalinity that it acquires by contact with limestone in the absence of excess carbon dioxide. Improved methods have been developed for the treatment of waters that contain ingredients that render them difficult to filter. Precipitation of the water to a particular faintly acid reaction—"pH control"—at the moment it passes to the filters, has been an important improvement. Automatic instruments of record rate of filtration or of pH of head, and automatic pH indicators, are being more generally used.

Some waters that are high in magnesium salts are now being purified by the use of an excess of lime, followed by recarbonation with carbon dioxide gas. This promises to be a great improvement over methods that have previously been in use, in that it removes some of the minerals responsible for the hardness of the water without introducing anything else in their place.

TAX COMMISSION MEMBER ASKS FOR UNIFORM SYSTEM

(Associated Press Local Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 9.—A tentative plan of the state tax commission for standardizing taxation in Oregon and reaching a uniform system of taxation for all counties was presented to the convention of assessors here today by Charles V. Galloway, commission member, who has been assigned to local tax questions.

"The program for improvement of assessment and taxation methods in Oregon," Galloway said, "is not one of the theories looking to some form of taxation other than we now have, but it is one that accepts facts as they are—that real property and other tangible resources will continue to bear a heavy tax load until such time as evolution may bring about a more equitable system. We don't know when that will be."

"Our task now is equalization—the raising of the low spots and the lowering of the high spots. Testimony of the assessors yesterday furnished the commission as a basis on which it will prepare the county ratios showed that there is a considerable lack of uniformity in assessments and results."

"This thing of each county being a law unto itself must come to an end. It is not that the commission is going to take over the work of the assessors, but that by cooperation between the assessors and the commission we may work out a standardization. It is going to cost the counties and the state some money, but not a great deal. We feel that at least one deputy assessor in each county should be assigned to work with the representatives of the commission in classifying property for taxation. We want you to go to work at once with your county courts and make provision for that in the county budgets."
