DAYS CREEK HIGH SCHOOL WILL HAVE NEW GYMNASIUM

DAYS CREEK, Nov. 9.—At a special meeting of the Days Creek school board, October 31, it was decided to build a floor in the play shed to provide for basketball and other indoor sports.

F. C. Chapin, of Myrtle Creek, who has been employed in rebuilding the school science laboratory, will be in charge of the work.

An offer by the student body of the high school to do the excavating and concrete work was accepted by the board and the boys have been spending all their spare time the last week on this work. The concrete for the floor will be poured Saturday by the high school boys, while the girls will, as their contribution, provide a picnic lunch at noon.

When finished the school will have a fine playing floor 40 feet by 70 feet.
