

CELEBRATION HERE ON ARMISTICE DAY PASSES SMOOTHLY

The Armistice day celebration staged by Gopqua post of the American Legion was successful from every standpoint. The attendance was unusually good, particularly at the football game in the afternoon. The parade in the morning was one of the best ever presented on Armistice day. More than 500 veterans were guests of the post at the free venison barbecue at noon.

Made throughout the day was furnished by two bands, the Roseburg Municipal band and the Southern band. Both organizations participated in the parade, played concerts on the streets and played at the football field, furnishing much entertainment to the many celebrants.

The machine gun demonstration staged by the local national guard company at night was very spectacular and was witnessed by a huge crowd. The hundreds of people gathered at the foot of Mosher street at 7:30 p. m. were quite disappointed when there was no evidence of the national guard company at the appointed hour. Suddenly, however, there was a flash of a giant dynamite bomb, and a hidden machine gun opened fire from a clump of timber on the river bank. The startled crowd was thrilled by the unusual sight of the tracer ammunition, which lit up the sky as the flaming bullets streaked across the river to break into myriad stars or firecrackers in sparkling stream.

PARENTS URGED TO VISIT SCHOOLS IN EDUCATION WEEK

Education week is being observed in the city schools, starting today and continuing until Friday. Parents are being urged to visit the grade schools Wednesday and the high schools Thursday. Regular school work will be carried on each day, and parents will attend classes with their children. A special committee, composed of representatives of each school, has been named, and is taking charge of the Education week activities. A statement regarding the work of the grade schools is made by this committee as follows:

Another school year is well started and the enrollment is noticeably larger than at this time last year. After a three and a half months' vacation the pupils were eager to get back to school.

A few of the classes are small, while others are taxing the seating capacity of the rooms; especially is this true of the beginning classes at Fullerton and Benson. A part-time teacher has been employed at the Fullerton school to relieve the crowded conditions there.

Varied activities are being carried on in the different buildings. The parent-teacher associations have started their year's programs, each one aiming to do some one particular thing for the betterment of the school of which it is a part; for example, the Fullerton association is considering the purchasing of instruments for a primary orchestra; the Rose association a radio and Benson association the buying of more new books for the library of the school.

Our remedial teacher, Mrs. Ruth Conkey, is doing very commendable work. Her pupils are showing up splendidly. Her work is with those pupils who need special help in the fundamentals of arithmetic and with those who for any reason need special attention.

The week-day Bible school is for pupils of the fourth, fifth and sixth grades. The enrollment to date is 240 or 94 per cent of the enrollment in those grades. Three rooms in the city are 100 per cent in this work.

Many new phases of instruction are being carried out this fall, among which are individual instruction in geography; new methods in reading and spelling and free expression periods where we find the tiny tots sewing, cutting out doll clothes, using coping saws and embarking on their free expression classes meet but twice a week for twenty minutes.

Miss Marie Ritz, the art supervisor, is correlating the art work with the social subjects as far as practicable and is also encouraging

What these small things were, I have no guilty conscience whatsoever, I feel.

Engages \$5 Flight Miss Rockwell went to the airport from the home of her brother, Donald Rockwell, in Yonkers, N. Y., where she had been living recently.

In the operations office of the Curtiss-Wright flying service she told William B. White, traffic manager, that she wanted to fly high.

"I asked her how high," he said, and she only replied, "real high." "I asked her if 20,000 feet would be high enough and she answered in the affirmative. I told her that the charge for such a flight would be high.

"Well," she said, "I just wanted to go for a \$5 flight, that is all I have."

Pilot's Version Edward F. Booth, the pilot who was assigned to fly the small cabin monoplane placed at the girl's disposal, told how she questioned him regarding the operation of the doors before they took off.

operated as ordinary doors. He said she also asked whether he would lose his head if anything unusual occurred in the air, to which he shook his head negatively.

"I took off in a large circle and made altitude," said Booth, "when at about 1500 feet I looked back and saw that the passenger had her eyes tightly closed. Thinking that possibly she was frightened by a first flight, I again tried to speak to her and reassure her that everything was all right. At I turned the second time she opened her eyes and asked for our altitude. I said we were about 1500 feet. She then indicated that she wished to go higher, so I continued a gentle climb, turning back over the Curtiss airport from the north.

"At about 2000 feet I felt the ship rise as if caused by rough air. That surprised me as the air was smooth. It then occurred to me that when a door is opened the ship will rise slightly and veer. I then looked back to see the open door, caught a glimpse of the passenger falling from space about 20 or 25 feet away."

Booth led airport officials to the spot where the body was found about a mile north of the airport.

Miss Rockwell graduated from Drew seminary last June. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dean W. Rockwell of Philadelphia.

Her brother said his sister had often spoken of suicide. He said she was fond of reading and had done some writing. He said she cared little for social activities, was very moody at times and her spirits vacillated from one extreme to the other.

The small coastwise shipping appeared to have suffered severely although with little loss of life. Sailing barges with small crews were badly buffeted on the south and east coasts.

Local boatmen had a strenuous time getting three such vessels into the harbor after their crews had reached the exhaustion point. Thirty of the crew of the Italian steamer Nimbo were dramatically rescued by a lifeline from the cliff top at New Haven.

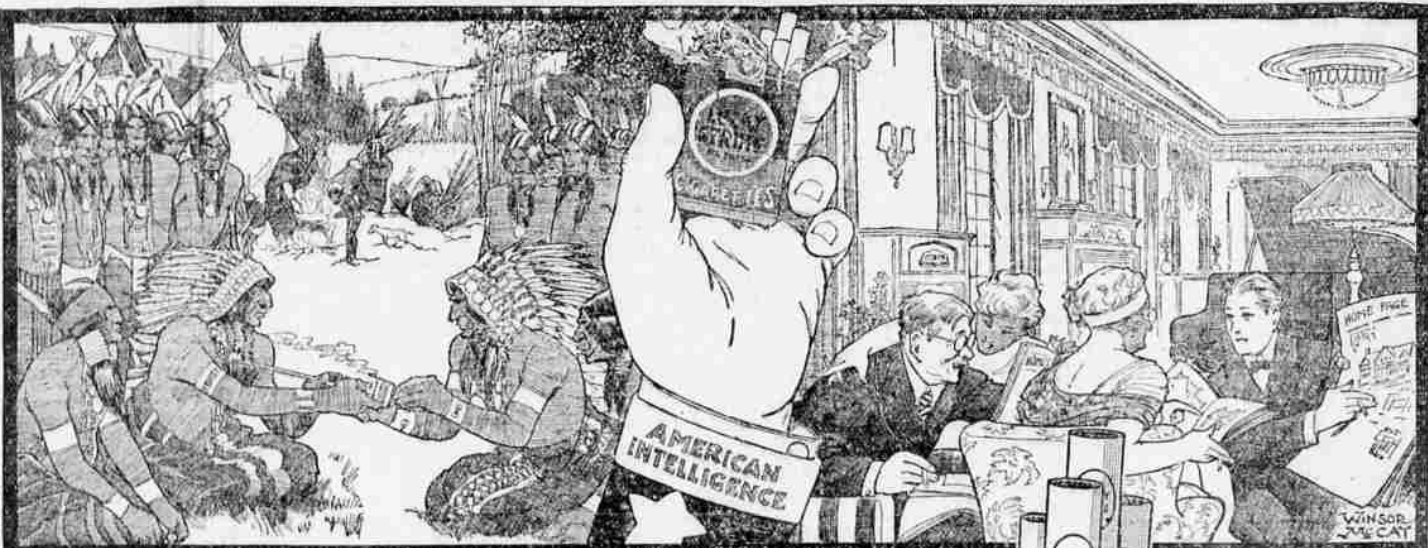
