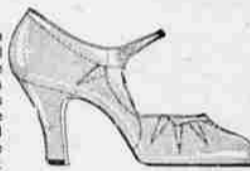

ROSEBURG SCHOOLS
INVITE VISITS IN
EDUCATION WEEK

Visitation Day for the senior high school has been set for Thursday, November 14. Parents are welcome visitors any day of the year, but are especially invited to visit that day.

Roseburg has, for the last few years, during national education week set a visitation day for each school in the city in an effort to get more visits from parents.

There are 11 different subjects offered for students in the high school. Languages, including French, Latin and Spanish, are taught by Miss Anderson.

Mr. Beard teaches civics, and Mr. Riley history. Other history classes are taught by Mr. Roser, who teaches part time at junior high, and by Mr. Larson, the principal of the senior high school.

There are 12 classes in English—sophomore, junior, and senior. Miss Duke instructs sophomore classes; Miss Timmons, junior, and Miss Buchanan, senior. The latter also has a public speaking class.

Commercial subjects are handled by Miss Thomas and Mr. Craig. These include typing, bookkeeping and shorthand.

Agricultural subjects, including farm animals, farm mechanics, and farm crops prove interesting and useful to the boys. Mr. Grow is the instructor.

The science subjects, chemistry, zoology, botany, and physics, are taught by Mr. Hiett.

Miss Ueland teaches mathematics—geometry and algebra.

The girls' and the boys' glee clubs are under the direction of Miss Mills, and the orchestra is directed by Mr. Langenberg.

The well-being of the student is taken care of by the physical education classes. Girls' classes meet Tuesday and Thursday, and boys' classes are held Monday and Wednesday.

ninth grade—boys 64, girls 53. This makes a total enrollment of 300. In all, nineteen teachers are employed, of whom twelve are women and seven men.

Some changes were made in the course of study this year. Spelling (in connection with mathematics) and penmanship (in connection with geography) are now taught throughout the seventh grade instead of nine weeks in each the seventh and eighth grades.

Effective subjects are offered to give the student an opportunity to prepare for future education, life work, or present individual interests. In the seventh grade, in addition to required subjects—mathematics, English, geography, history, penmanship, spelling, and physical education—the student chooses industrial arts or home economics.

Still wider choice is given in the ninth grade. With English, junior business training, occupations, and physical education the only required subjects; the remainder of the course may be made up from the following: industrial arts, home economics, algebra, physiology, general science, Latin or farm animals.

To further satisfy the interests of individual students, each day in addition to the six 55 minute periods of regular school work, a 25 minute period from 10:40 to 11:05 is used for various activities designed to give every student a time to satisfy his interests in a recreational or more serious manner.

Among these activities are an orchestra, two glee clubs—one for boys and one for girls, public speaking, embroidery, dramatics, volley ball, reading clubs, picture clubs, campfire girls, manners and dress, stamp and coin collector's club, arts and crafts, sketching, pep clubs, athletic clubs, puzzle clubs and outdoor games.

The variety of activities is larger this year than ever before and every student can find at least one of interest to him. Students are not compelled to take part in any activity but, with few exceptions, join one or more. If not satisfied, a student may transfer from one activity to another with very little difficulty. On Thursday at this period there will be a general assembly.

At this time announcements are made, special days celebrated, music enjoyed, students entertain, or pep meetings held.

TIENTSIN, China, Nov. 13.—Aaron Brenner, New York furrier, arrived here today after nearly a

week's captivity in the hands of kidnapers, believed to be Russians. He was in a highly nervous condition and unable to give a coherent account of what had happened to him.

A telephone message was received after he arrived at his home to the effect that "there are 20 of us" and that they would get revenge if his "prisoner" is not kept. It was believed the "prisoner" was to pay the ransom demand which finally was reduced to \$50,000, since Joseph Brenner, brother of the furrier, denied any ransom

MELLON AND AIDES
VISIT PRESIDENT

(Associated Press Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—An early morning visit was made to the White House today by Secretary Mellon, under Secretary Mills and a third person believed to be Governor Young of the federal reserve board.

The three went to President Hoover's private office by the rear door of the executive offices, the entrance customarily used by Secretary Mellon, Governor Young declined to say whether he was in the party.

No comment was immediately forthcoming at the White House as to the nature of the call or the identity of the persons who made it.
