REDISCOUNT RATE OF NEW YORK BANK DROPS HALF CENT

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—The New York federal reserve bank today decreased the rediscount from 5 to 4 1/2 per cent.

The first reduction, from 6 to 5 per cent, was made after the first violent convulsion of the market in the recent collapse, when it became apparent that the heavy flow of credit into speculative channels had ended. The crash of the market has reduced brokers' loans to the lowest levels in more than a year.

The reduction to the 4 1/2 per cent places the New York rate 1/2 of one per cent below the rates in force at the other 11 federal reserve banks, and is interpreted in Wall street as foreshadowing a general reduction.

The 5 per cent rate was established about two weeks ago. The change is effective tomorrow.

The reduction to 4 1/2 per cent places the rate at the lowest level since June, 1928.

Wall street cast aside its mantle of gloom today as prices of leading securities rallied \$2 to \$20 a share and closed higher at the top. It was the first sustained rally after a week of destructive liquidation which has wiped out billions of dollars in quoted values, and sent scores of stocks to prices which represented only a small fraction of their year's high levels.

DISSOLUTE MATE OF DEAD PRINCESS PUT UNDER ARREST

BOON, Germany, Nov. 14.—The grim tragedy which ended the life of the last days of Princess Victoria Schaumburg-Lippe, sister of the former kaiser, was again sounded today with the arrest of Alexander Subloff, her youthful husband, whose escapades had caused his exile from Germany.

The young Russian dancer and adventurer who married the princess, thirty-four years his senior, two years ago, was picked up by the police enroute from Treves to Frankfurt in an attempt to attend his wife's funeral. Only ten days ago a divorce suit the princess had brought against him was filed.

Subloff was arrested for violating an order forbidding him entering into Prussia. He also was held on criminal charges brought by many creditors here from whom he is alleged to have obtained money under false pretenses by means of the unauthorized use of his wife's name.

Shortly before her last illness, the princess principally supported herself to satisfy many of her dissolute husband's debts.

NEW NAME GIVEN SKAGGS SAFEWAY

Announcement was made today of a change in name of Skaggs Safeway stores in this city to "Safeway Stores," dropping the name "Skaggs."

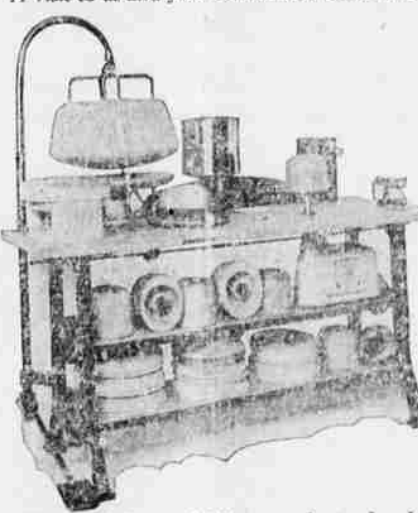
