Several records are claimed for "The Hollywood Revue," the new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer musical production which recently made its bow at Grauman's Chinese theatre, Los Angeles, and which will open at the Antlers theatre Thursday.

HOOVER ASKS AID OF NATION IN RED CROSS CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—National-wide response to the annual roll call of the American Red Cross was asked of the American people by President Hoover.

Mr. Hoover, as president of the United States, is president of the Red Cross. The roll call began Armistice day and will close Thanksgiving day. The chief executive's announcement follows:

"Both as president of the United States and as president of the American Red Cross, I earnestly bespeak the cooperation of every American citizen in the great humanitarian work of the Red Cross. Its prompt efficiency in time of disaster, and its continuing service in numerous less spectacular but no less important tasks of relief, make it an indispensable part of our national life. Every American should be a member, and I urge all to enroll."

LINDSAY TO TAKE ESME HOWARD'S JOB EARLY NEXT YEAR

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Sir Ronald Lindsay, permanent under-secretary of state for foreign affairs, will replace Sir Esme Howard as British ambassador at Washington early next year.

Announcement of the appointment was made at the British foreign office said Sir Esme, whose tenure at the American post has extended beyond retirement age, would retire with the new ambassador's advent.

Sir Robert Vansittart, principal private secretary to Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, will succeed to the post in the foreign ministry vacated by Sir Ronald.

Sir Robert accompanied Mr. MacDonald on his American trip and had been mentioned prominently in gossip as to Sir Esme Howard's probable successor.

KNIFE BANDITS ARE SOUGHT IN SOUTH

Health Bulletin

LAUGHTER

(State Board of Health)
The uncomfortable feeling about the heart may in some cases be controlled to a great extent by the mind. Probably one of the most favorable influences exerted on the heart when there is considerable depression is that produced by laughter. Attendance at the theatre and the enjoyment of good hearty laughter have brought relief more than any other way.

It is very probable that this is due to the fact that the up and down movement of the diaphragm in laughter causes direct massage of the heart and therefore stimulates its activity. The diaphragm action is particularly on the thin-walled right heart which lies along the diaphragm. It is in this part of the organ, however, that the movement of the heart begins, and therefore it is not surprising that direct stimulation this way regularizes the action of the heart. Perhaps the accessory effect of laughter on the lungs has something to do with the favorable action on the heart. The jerky movements of the diaphragm in the midst of hearty laughter, consequent upon the interrupted laughter, cause the air within the lungs to be confined at a rather higher pressure than usual, and this acts directly on the heart, pressing it and probably stimulating its activity. Perhaps, also, the increased oxygenation of the blood due to laughter has something to do with the favorable influence that is noted.

This experience would seem to indicate that one of the most important principles for a patient suffering from discomfort or over-consciousness of heart action is

to insist on laughter. The patients are very likely to be rather disposed to depression and they are more afraid that laughter may cause their heart to stop beating. It has just the opposite effect and once it has been decided that the heart condition is functional, and the laugh should be encouraged to as great extent as possible.

STATE MUSEUM IS PLANNED BY ARTS CLUB AT CAPITAL

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 13.—A state museum, to be organized and sponsored by the Salem Arts league and located in rooms set apart in one of the state buildings in Salem, is proposed in a letter from the arts league to the state board of control. The letter is signed by Mrs. Florence B. Cartwright, president, and Ruth Marie Braut, art director of the league.

Secretary of State Hal E. Ross, to whom the letter has been handed by Secretary Cass A. Abrams of the state board, is favorable to the proposal. In his reply to the letter, however, he will say that definite action cannot be taken until the completion of the new state office building. At present no rooms are available for a museum collection.

BRODIE'S NAME TO BE REMOVED FROM MINISTER'S LIST

Brodie's name had been given President Hoover by Senator McNary, Oregon, according to Washington news dispatches. The editor is one of the three Oregon newspapermen who have been named minister to Siam.

SONNENBERG BEATS OLD ENEMY, LEWIS

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14.—Gus Sonnenberg retained his heavy-weight wrestling championship before 11,000 persons here last night by winning a series of three falls from Ed "Strangler" Lewis in a return match.

The champion's flying tackle was working better than in the meeting between the two here recently in which Lewis claimed Sonnenberg tackled him while his back was turned after he thought the champion had been disqualified.

Sonnenberg took the first fall in 24 minutes, 45 seconds, lost the second to Lewis on a headlock in 13 minutes, 33 seconds, and won the final fall in 3 minutes, 5 seconds. Both the champions' falls were recorded by way of the flying tackle route. Sonnenberg raised one tackle near the end of the match, and fell into the press box. He returned to the ring in 15 seconds.

U. OF O. PLANS BIG HOMECOMING FETE NOVEMBER 15-16

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Nov. 14.—(Special)—Everywhere on the University of Oregon campus students are preparing for what will prove to be the most auspicious homecoming celebration ever held in Eugene. Under the direction of a student directorate headed by Keith Hall, Marshfield, many sub-committees will use the coming week as the final opportunity for rounding up the minute details of the occasion, which occurs next Friday and Saturday, November 15 and 16. "Home to Honor Oregon" has again been accepted as the slogan for the homecoming event this year.

That the 1929 homecoming will bring to the university campus the largest crowd of alumni ever to assemble here for any one occasion has been verified by Jeanette Calkins, secretary of the alumni association, who estimates the total will reach 2000.

The delegates from Douglas county to the alumni association convention is William Gerretsen, Roseburg.

When the thousands of graduates pour into Eugene for the event, they will be greeted by symbols of welcome all over the campus. A huge Neon arch sign will be placed at the entrance to the campus on Thirteenth street.

One of the most colorful of the numerous events scheduled for the weekend is to be the traditional rally and parade Friday night. James Raley, Pendleton, is in charge of the event. The famous noise parade of old is to be revived this year, when steam roller, excavators, automobiles, trucks, horns, sirens, rattles and every piece of noise manufacturer imaginable will shoot its way down the line of march.

Following the rally festivities in the downtown district, the journalism jamboree will be held at the armory under the direction of the students in the school of journalism of the university.

The world's premiere of "Ed's Coed," the campus movie, will be shown at the McDonald theatre at 11 p. m. at a midnight matinee.

Of prime importance this year to visiting alumni will be the convention to be held Saturday morning at guild hall on the campus. Official delegates of the 22 alumni districts in the state will be present to take part in the business session of the association. This year will bring about the annual dated business session all in one morning instead of the former method of having meetings for two and three days. New officers for the coming two years will be nominated at this time. From the convention the alumni will join the undergraduates in making merry at the annual homecoming luncheon to be held at McArthur court.

The highlight event of the weekend will take place at 1:30 p. m. when the University of Oregon and Oregon State Agricultural college meet in their traditional battle on Hayward field. An over-crowded field of spectators, nearly 18,000 will be present at the game, according to an announcement made by Ronald H. Robnett, assistant graduate manager. Several surprise features have been planned to provide amusement between the halves. Amid all the decoration on the field will be two large flags, one with the name of the class having the largest number of graduates present for the occasion and the other for the oldest alumni class represented at the 1929 homecoming.

In the evening two homecoming dances will be held on the campus. One will be held at McArthur court for underclassmen while the other will take place at the Goring building for upperclassmen and graduates.

KITZMILLER MAY BE IN OREGON LINE AGAINST STATERS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 14.—A big black bear which stalked the Oregon football campus the first part of the week stood shorn of some of its fierceness today with the return of Johnny Kitzmiller, the "flying Dutchman," to uniform. With Kitzmiller out of the lineup when Oregon meets Oregon State here Saturday in the annual homecoming game, the chances of a Webfoot victory were not considered too strong. Coach John J. McEwan was convinced today, however, that the mainstay of the Oregon backfield offensive will be found in the opening lineup.

McEwan is taking no chances, however, and yesterday's practice saw Johnny Londahl, Kitzmiller's understudy, booting punts and hurling passes throughout the session. Londahl probably will get the nod if Kitzmiller is unable to take the field Saturday.

McEwan declared yesterday that Ed Moeller, husky discs thrower, has displaced Hal Hutton at full-back.

Dave Mann, captain, and Bobby Robinson probably will complete the backfield, the Oregon mentor said.

The line, McEwan declared, will be practically the same Saturday as in the past with the exception that Sy West may replace Jerry Lillie at guard.

STOCK LOSSES ARE CAUSE OF WEALTHY GAS MAN'S DEATH

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 13.—Stock market losses said to have aggregated a million dollars were believed responsible for the suicide of Robert M. Searle, president of the Rochester Gas and Electric corporation, at his home here today.

He was found on a bathroom floor at his home on Runwell street by Herman Russell, vice-president of the company. A gas jet was open and asphyxiation was given as the cause of death. Coroner Richard A. Leonardo issued a certificate of death by suicide during temporary mental derangement.

Searle came to Rochester yesterday from New York where he had been associated with the main office of the company, which is a subsidiary of Associated Gas and Electric Industries, for the past three years.

According to Vice-President Russell, Searle paid an earlier visit to Rochester last week and at that time talked freely of his heavy losses in the stock market. He is said to have feared at that time that his original fortune of more than \$1,500,000 was worth less than \$500,000 at present market rates.
