

Oregon University and Staters in Annual Grid Battle

PERFECT WEATHER FAVORS GAME IN EUGENE STADIUM

Homecoming Event Attracts
Capacity Through—Both
Teams Considered
in Good Shape.

Battle Between Notre Dame
and Trojans at Soldier
Field in Chicago
Lures 120,000.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 15.—The mythical state college football championship was the object of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college eleven here today. Today's game was to be the 35th annual football contest between the two Oregon institutions.

The University of Oregon, has won a majority of the games but the staters were in a revengeful mood today, having lost last year's contest to the Webfoot.

Ideal fall football weather was predicted for the game and a record crowd was assured.

Rivalry between the two institutions has run unusually high this season. First part of the huge concrete "O" on Skinner's Butte here, symbol of the University of Oregon, was blasted away. Several nights later an unidentified gang invaded Oregon State college campus and spread the Webfoot colors haphazardly upon buildings.

Since then both institutions have maintained freshmen campus guards, armed with baseball bats, crowbars and other impediments of warfare.

Both teams have had two weeks of rest and were primed for the "civil war."

Other Western Games
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—The thunder of decisive battles destined to either make or break leaders of far western football will echo over half a dozen Pacific coast gridirons today, as six conference teams fight it out, and a like number tear at each other for non-conference football honors.

Undefeated and unrivaled thus far in their most difficult conquests, the Golden Bears of California will come to grips at Berkeley with an old rival from the north, Coach Knocia Bagshaw's Washington Huskies, who thus far have failed to win a game this season, but still are rated a formidable foe.

The powerful St. Mary's eleven, undefeated and tied only by California, will meet the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins. St. Mary's was the favored team, holding a record among the best eleven of the season.

Idaho's Vandals and the Bulldogs of Gonzaga will battle it out at Moscow in another non-conference joust.

Eastern Program
NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—More than a quarter of a million football enthusiasts were attracted to Eastern stadiums today to witness half a dozen climactic games involving old rivalries and one inter-sectional clash—Missouri against New York University.

For the greatest crowd, 78,000, the magnet was a game at New Haven, the fifty-third clash between Yale and Princeton. With Albie Booth lamed, Yale had its hands full.

At Baker field in New York, Pennsylvania was a hot favorite to down Columbia. At Syracuse Colgate was the favorite over Syracuse. Some 30,000 were intent on seeing each of these games.

At Harvard 40,000 or more looked for Holy Cross to give Harvard a hard time.

Missouri and New York University attracted 40,000 to the Yankee stadium.

The crowd at Hanover, N. H., for the Dartmouth-Cornell game was limited to 15,000 by the size of the stands.

Pittsburgh and Carnegie Tech attracted 55,000 to the Big Panther sander.

Interest in Washington centered in the clash between Georgetown and West Virginia.

Trojans vs. Notre Dame
CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—Notre Dame's pathway to a mythical national football championship was blocked today by the University of Southern California. Soldier field was prepared for a crowd of 120,000 persons; one of the really great throngs of all sportsmen.

Although the victim of a surprise defeat early this season by California, Southern California leads the country in scoring and aimed today to add to its string of triumphs.

The contest promises a struggle between the power house type of attack as used by Southern California, and the speed assault employed by the Ramblers. Neither team has used the air to any great extent this season, but both are ready to shoot everything they had today.

**WATERS DEFEATS
HERMAN IN ROUGH
STRUGGLE ON MAT**

Tactics evidently considered legitimate under wrestling rules but which to the 150 spectators present appeared decidedly "dirty," brought victory to Texas today. Waters over Cal Herman of Roseburg, at Moose hall last night. The match was decided in two straight falls, aided by an assortment of open-hand blows on part of the victor, and lasted a little less than 25 minutes. The referee was introduced as "Jack Martin" of Centralia, Wash., who was a principal in one of the boxing preliminaries.

The first fall was registered by Waters in just thirty seconds by the following method of attack: First, spalling a mouthful of water in Herman's face; second, cutting him in the face and then in the stomach, sending Herman to the canvas on his hands and knees; third, jumping with both feet squarely on Herman's back, and fourth, rolling him over and pinning him with a double arm scissors.

So quiet and unusual was Waters' performance that the crowd seemed dazed for a few moments, but when it recovered it handed the Texan a heavy "razzing" He

got a fresh evidence of spectators' disapproval of his rough style when he reappeared for the second struggle, but it did not cause him to refrain from slugging at every opportunity. Herman did his best to beat the Texan in a sportsman-like manner and was on the verge of doing so when a succession of slaps from Water's hand on Herman's stomach rendered the local men helpless and gave the Texan the second fall at the end of 24 minutes. This finale came after Herman had worn his opponent down with a series of headlocks and heavy slams to the mat. In the last crash to the floor, Herman fell alongside his opponent, who reached over and knocked the wind out of Herman with blows on the mid section and then, without resistance, put his victim's shoulders to the canvas.

The crowd thought the Texan should have been disqualified for his slugging and howled its disapproval of the verdict. One spectator was so insistent on this point that he came to blows with the referee after the official descended from the ring and there was a lively battle for about a half minute before officers intervened. Another aftermath was a challenge from Herman to Waters for a second battle, with "nothing barred."

Preliminaries
Wrestling Referee Martin, as a principal in one of the boxing bouts, substituted against Joe Corbett, who was substituted against Corbett, at about 155, had a weight advantage of at least 25 pounds and made no effort to play his lighter opponent. It was just a four-round sparring exhibition that the crowd accepted good naturedly.

The second boxing preliminary lasted less than two rounds but was a slam-bang affair from start to finish, with Battling Judd of this city emerging victor over Kid Maley of Sutherland. In the first round honors were about even. Early in the second Maley was floored for the count of six. A few seconds after regaining his feet he went down for the second time and stayed there for the fatal ten.

Pat Franco, 128 pounder, had a weight margin of 13 pounds over Dan Schaeffer in the curtain raiser and the result was a one-sided affair that was halted in the first round after Schaeffer had taken a count of five and was unable to withstand further attacks from the heavier boy.

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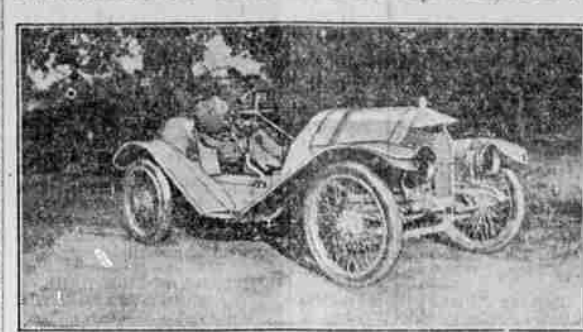
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Remember the Oriole Speedster?



Many hundreds of thousands of miles of Texas mud and 18 years of continuous service are behind this old car, one of 673 Oakland 33 Oriole Speedsters built by the Oakland Motor Car company in 1911. It has worn out four speedometers. Still in good running condition, it recently was turned in on a new Oakland by Fred O. Grimes of Hillsboro, Texas, who purchased the Oriole as a used car in 1912.

Do you recall the Oakland 33 Oriole speedster whose now lines created a new vogue back in 1912?

It was a foot or two closer to the ground than its towering contemporary cars, the Oriole as created with having earned the name of the high-wheeled, top-heavy steam-winders, whose brass-hooded covers previously had been removed as the last word in automobile design.

The Oriole was radically new. It had wire wheels, open buckles, seats leaning against a big cylindrical gas tank, an almost horizontal steering post and a hood strapped down over its big rectangular engine. The spare tire slanted rakishly aft.

The car followed closely the lines of the racing machines of that day in which Oldfield, the Palma, Teitzel and Harroun were competing at speeds of 60 to 70 miles an hour against such pilots as Brown. During 1911 Oakland built 673 of these rakish Oriole speedsters with the factory's limited production facilities always proving inadequate to meet demand.

Some of the Oriones competed in the speed contests and road races that were popular from 1901 to 1914. One of them was purchased in 1912 as a used car by Fred O. Grimes, veteran gardener of Hillsboro, Texas. Through the intervening 17 years the Oriole wore out four speedometers with a total mileage aggregating many hundreds of thousands of miles.

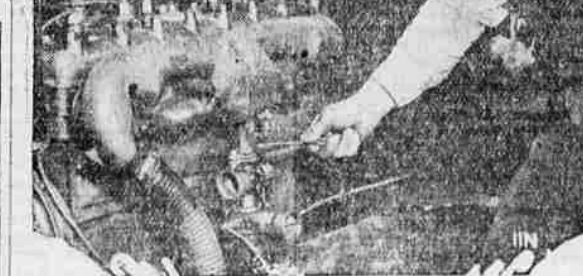
During recent years the Oriole was utilized as a service car, with which Mr. Grimes rescued countless automobiles from the muddy roads in the country surrounding Hillsboro.

But last week Mr. Grimes drove the old Oriole speedster to the Oakland-Pontiac salesroom at Hillsboro.

"I'm afraid I'll have to turn her in on a new car," he said. "We've grown old together, and still not exactly that because I've grown old faster than the car. It's quit me. It's still in fine shape. But I'm not so spry as I was. I've reached the age where I appreciate the comforts of a closed car and self starter."

He chose an Oakland All-American, six convertible Cabriolet, worthy descendant of a sturdy and spirited automotive ancestor.
