GIFT PIPE ORGAN ARRIVING SOON AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The organ loft is located in the west wing of the structure, about 12 feet above the floor level of the auditorium in conformity to the accommodation of the large pipes of the organ. A curved ceiling above the choir loft, will provide an opening directly into the organ chamber, so that the sound will be directed out and down into the auditorium in conformity to the most accepted methods of acoustics.

The organ chamber is finished in special acoustical plaster, particularly designed for such purposes, providing for elimination of undesirable overtones and will secure a maximum blending of tones from the pipes.

Due to the foresight of the congregation in its construction plans, very little alteration will be required in the way of making installation.

Mr. Perkins notified the congregation several weeks ago that he had arranged to give an organ to the church in memory of his mother, and has been investigating several types of organ before completing the deal. The Robert Morton organ, being a standard instrument and built on the coast, was finally selected by him, and the congregation, through Mrs. Stranex, yesterday received his letter announcing that the contract had been signed and that the organ would be forthcoming within a short time.
