When Bandits Rob Indiana Bank



The crowd which gathered around the First National Bank of Pern, immediately following the get-away of six bandits after they had robbed the bank of \$50,000 in one of the most daring daylight holdups in the Middle West. The six men, armed with machine guns, sawed off shotguns and revolvers shot a policeman and a pedestrian, terrorized residents of this city and sent volleys of shots up and down the street to intimidate police. Ten employees of the bank were forced to stand aside as the robbers systematically looted the vaults, cashiers' cages and security containers. Inset shows Martha Endicott, stenographer of the bank and Gordon Smith, assistant cashier, who were beaten and hauled by the six bandits.
