DAIRY DISTRICTS OF DOUGLAS JOIN TO FIGHT DISEASE

Both the Loon lake and the Smith river sections have gone on record to eradicate the most widespread and most dangerous type of dairy cow disease.

Action in this direction was taken at meetings held at the former place Monday and at Smith River yesterday.

Together with N. C. Jamison, dairy specialist at O. S. C., and Dr. A. M. McCapes, veterinary at the experiment station, County Agent J. C. Leedy visited the two localities where the plan of the Oregon state livestock sanitary board was explained.

Contagious abortion is the disease against which the dairymen are organizing. By forming "free areas" and compelling all producers to join, it is predicted that the affliction will be wiped out.

Prof. Jamison discussed feeding and balanced rations and the importance of good dairy bulls and Dr. McCapes explained the method of eradicating abortion. Mr. Leedy discussed the extension of dairy program in Douglas county and received suggestions of the dairymen in the two localities as to what lines to follow.

Portland's so-called annual winter crime wave continued unabated throughout the night with a series of attacks on women, men and children despite an augmented police force and Chief of Police L. V. Jenkins' imperative orders that the city be "cleaned up."

Dozens of men and women were halted early today by special policemen and asked for explanations why they were about after night. But two were taken to the police station for further investigation.

The police chief today warned householders to lock all doors and do away with ladders to prevent marauders from entering second story windows left open for ventilation.

Florida Shorthill, 16, routed a man from his bedroom by screaming after she struggled with him and broke his grasp upon her throat.

D. M. Klewer, elderly bachelor, suffered severe gashes on his head when he opened the door of his home to a stranger who wielded a blackjack.

Two other women reported their screams raised intruders from a porch and from a rear door where one marauder made three attempts to open the door with a key.

Did Mark Twain's Jumping Frog Really Jump?



A Butte, Montana, man—interested in the literary background of the west—recently visited Angels Camp in his Chevrolet coach. There the Butte man found evidence that perhaps the famed jumping frog story of Mark Twain was but a yarn told around the camp-fires.

Perhaps no frog in the history of the world played such an important part in literature as the famed "jumping frog" glorified by Mark Twain. The story, "The Jumping Frog," made literary fame in Twain, America had another great humorist. So quaint and fantastic was the tale that thousands have wondered since the story was written whether or not the frog really jumped. Those thousands do know that the story of the jumping frog was received so enthusiastically that it was the first recognition of the genius that alone belonged to Mark Twain.

The famous frog is supposed to have jumped at Angels Camp. Others claim San Andreas was the scene of the contest; while still others maintain that the frog never jumped at all.

Recently a literary devotee from Butte, Montana, who was traveling through California in his Chevrolet coach, visited at Angels Camp, long enough to visit the country made famous by Twain and Bret Harte and to inquire into the authenticity of the jumping frog story. Here is one version—an ancient version, by the way—to which the literary man paid heed.

Mark Twain was living near his friends James and Stephen Gillie in Tuttle town. It was the practice of the men to congregate around the fire in the evening and spin yarns. An old timer told the story of the jumping frog—a story that was greeted with much speculation.

As soon as Mark Twain returned to San Francisco he wrote the story. The popularity of the tale enabled Twain to go east where he really won literary fame. Another version is that Twain picked up the story while acting as a pilot on the Mississippi river boats. Critics claim this version is without foundation, however.

The literary devotee from Butte traveled throughout the entire west in his search for material. He states that he is going to incorporate the data into a volume called "Literary Backgrounds of the Great West." He has traveled all the way, as he says, "the Chevrolet way" and he is very enthusiastic about the readability and economy of the Chevrolet six. He paid especial praise to the ease and dispatch with which the Chevrolet six surmounts steep grades. He plans to return to Butte after touring through Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Utah.

CONGRESS VOTES TO ADJOURN NEXT FRIDAY, 10 P. M.

(Associated Press Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—The senate today voted to adjourn sine die at 10 o'clock Friday night, after a week's session between the apical and regular sessions.

Senator Walsh of Montana, acting democratic leader and author of the adjournment resolution, said it was apparent it was impossible to pass the tariff bill before December 2, when the regular session begins and adjournment should be given at least a week to prepare for the winter term.

House leaders said they were confident that body would offer no objection to adjournment of congress next Friday.

HARRY SINCLAIR SERVING LAST DAY OF DOUBLE TERM

(Associated Press Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Harry P. Sinclair, oil crooner, indicted with the oil shahs and reports of the District of Columbia jail pharmacy today for the last time. At midnight tonight he will leave all that behind, his sentence for contempt of court and contempt of the senate completed.

After six and one-half months of confinement, the multimillionaire is expected to go at once to his luxurious Long Island home.

Sinclair entered the jail May 6 to serve terms of three months for refusing to answer questions of the senate committee investigating the oil scandals and of six months for contempt of the District of Columbia supreme court in connection with the shadowing of the jury when he was on trial with Albert B. Fall for conspiracy to defraud the government through the celebrated lease on the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve.

Portions of the two sentences ran concurrently and with allowance for five days off each month for good behavior, his stay in the jail was reduced to six months and fourteen days.

Drug store experience gained in the early days of his career led to his assignment as jail pharmacist and assistant to the jail physician.

M. F. RICE SUES ON AN AUTO ACCIDENT

A case in which M. F. Rice seeks damages from Nancy J. Gilbert as the result of an automobile accident last August will be heard before a jury in the court of Justice of the Peace C. F. Hopkins Thursday afternoon.

The case was filed last August following a collision of cars owned by the plaintiff and defendant. Time for the trial has been set by Justice Hopkins at 1:30 o'clock.

BABSON'S ATTACK ON SENATE DRAWS POINTED REPLIES

(Associated Press Special Wire)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Roger W. Babson, business statistician, who charged in a newspaper article today that the senate debate on the tariff was partly to blame for the stock market crash, was assailed as "unreliable" in the senate by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho.

Taking the floor after Senator Heflin, democratic, Alabama, had described Babson as a "tool of the predatory interests," and Senator Walsh of Montana, acting democratic leader, had characterized the statistician's statement as "obviously false," Borah said:

"He is utterly unreliable as to facts and utterly unsound as to his predictions."

The Idahoan said Babson, who was supposed to be unbiased in his business predictions, apparently was pleading the cause of those who would have the protective tariff system apply to manufacturing interests alone.

He said all the conflict in the senate was striving to do was to obtain a better share for agriculture in the protective tariff system.

After asserting industrial incomes had increased 52 per cent since 1919 and agricultural incomes had declined 20 per cent, Borah said:

"We serve notice on Mr. Babson and all his kind that until we do all we can to remedy this unusual condition we will not cease in our efforts."

Senator Glass, of Virginia, a former democratic secretary of the treasury, declared Babson's article evidently was part of an effort to "direct attention away from those responsible for this disaster."

ROCKY MOUNTAIN AREA IN GRIP OF ANNUAL FREEZE

(Associated Press Special Wire) DENVER, Colo., Nov. 20.—Zero and freezing temperatures were the rule throughout the Rocky mountain region today after a Tuesday snowstorm had covered most of the area.

Low temperatures ranging from zero in Montana to freezing weather in southern Colorado and northern New Mexico, followed in the wake of the storm, but there was little added precipitation.

Sub-zero temperatures were reported in the Judith basin, Mont., area early today, and at Livingston it was three degrees above zero with no let-up in the cold spell indicated. At Cheyenne three inches of snow lay on the ground, and Denver experienced a similar fall, the seventh snowfall of the season.

NOTED AMERICAN'S DAUGHTER PASSES

(Associated Press Special Wire) MILTON, Mass., Nov. 20.—Mrs. Edith Emerson Forbes, daughter of Ralph Waldo Emerson, the philosopher and essayist, and mother of W. Caswell Forbes, former governor general of the Philippines, died at her home here today. She was 88 years old.

DENISON CLAIMS LIQUOR DELIVERED HIM BY MISTAKE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—District Attorney Rover disclosed today that he had a receipt signed by Representative Edward E. Denison of Illinois for the liquor trunk on which an indictment of the Illinois representative on liquor charges was based.

The indictment of a member of the house—one who voted for the eighteenth amendment, the Volstead act and the Jones law—on charges of possession of intoxicating liquor heightened and intensified today the current furor over prohibition enforcement conditions in the nation's capital.

The accused legislator denied the charges from his home at Mayton and asserted that they were based upon the delivery, by mistake, of a trunk containing in-
