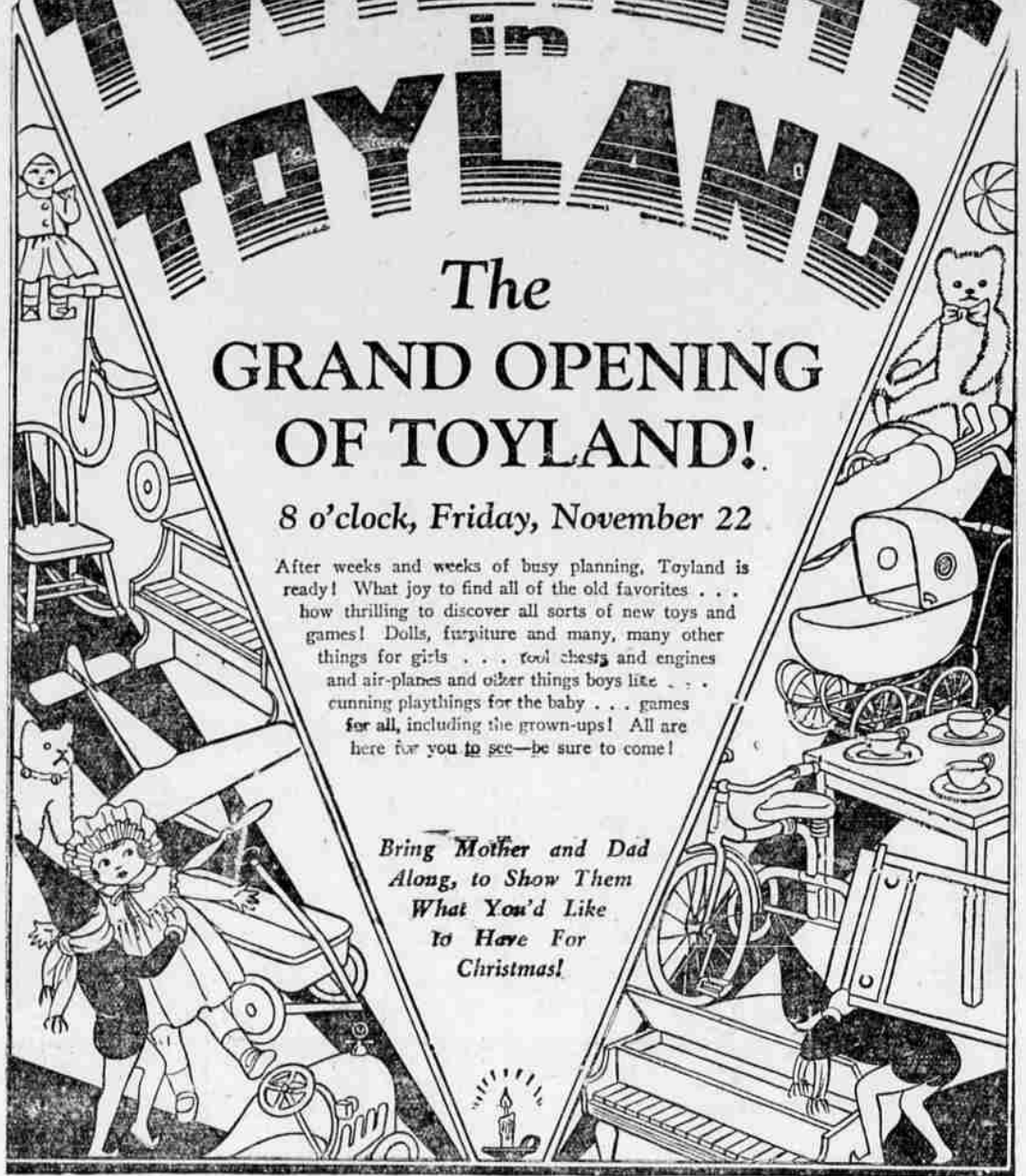

GRAIN ELEVATOR AT HAINES BURNS; WATCHMAN HURT

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 21.—Fire starting from a dust explosion in the E. W. Harting grain elevator at Haines, Ore., destroyed the elevator and adjoining warehouse and caused serious injury to Kenneth Dwy, 24, night watchman, early today.
Dwy is in a hospital here suffering burns about the face and body. Insurance agents estimated the loss at between \$25,000 and \$30,000, covered by insurance. Two railroad box cars, one of which was partially filled with grain, were destroyed. The elevator and warehouse were constructed 18 months ago.

TURKEY MARKET IN FRISCO UNCHANGED; SUPPLIES LIBERAL

CORVALLIS, Nov. 21.—(Special to the News-Review.)—The San Francisco turkey market is reported unchanged, trading satisfactory. Good offers. Supplies fairly liberal with buyers paying 35 to 37 cents for dressed young toms and selling to retailers at 38 to 42 cents. The New York market was quiet with western young toms quoted at 35 to 37 cents, young hens generally 2 cents less. Texas turkeys were 3 cents under the price for western birds. Boston market is unsettled with the demand improving. Receipts are increasing. Northwestern young toms quoted at 35 to 33 cents, hens one cent less. Texas turkeys 2 and 3 cents less.

W. O. W. MEMBERS COMBINE TO FIGHT FOR OLD POLICIES

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 21.—Plans for an organized fight for possession of old policies which were surrendered by members who accepted the higher insurance rates inaugurated by the administration at Denver last spring will be formulated at a mass meeting of the insurgent group of the Woodmen of the World here next Tuesday night.
Daniel Kelleher, insurgent leader, who today announced the mass meeting, said J. O. Wilson, chief of the Portland office, had been requested to appear before the meeting and explain what disposition is to be made of the old, or original policies exchanged by thousands of Woodmen for the new policies.
Kelleher expressed the opinion that camp clerks are prohibited under the Colorado court's order from accepting premiums tendered in payment on new policies.
