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CHICAGO KILLER LAUGHS AT POLICE

(Associated Press Local Wire)
CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—Melville Purves killed a man in the crowded Arlington cabaret early yesterday, was captured a moment later, and laughed about it.

The man he shot was his boyhood chum, Edward Tracy, 31, business agent of the sign and bulletin board hangers' union—a job Purves himself formerly held.

Purves and his brother, William, entered. They walked directly to a table where Tracy sat with a man who afterwards disappeared. No word was spoken. Purves thrust a gun at Tracy and fired one shot. Tracy fell with a bullet in his head. Purves fired three more, each bullet entering Tracy's head.

The Purves brothers strode across the floor as patrons huddled behind tables and chairs. They released the lock on the steel door guarding the club entrance and ran out.

Purves laughed, police said, when they sought to question him. "You're smart detectives," Purves said. "Find out about it. Yo, don't get me talking."
