Field Major Andrew Loney, pioneer Salvation army leader in the west, is spending several days this week in Roseburg, delivering a series of sermons relative to the army work. Major Loney states that he was persuaded by the army two years ago and since that time has been donating his time to the interests of the work in Montana, Oregon, Washington and Idaho. He has been doing army work for the past 42 years.

He is now campaigning eleven cities from The Dalles to Klamath Falls and will leave Roseburg the latter part of this week for Eugene, where he will open his meetings there. He states that in the early days of the army, there were only 46 officers in the western territory, while at the present time there are 700 officers. Also at that time there was only one small piece of property owned by the army in the west, that being in Oakland, California, while now they own millions of dollars worth of property in the western states.

Major Loney gave some very interesting figures on the number of people helped through the rescue homes for some girls and their babies, where hundreds of young girls are sheltered each year. During the year 1929, 7,000,000 men were sheltered overnight by the Salvation army throughout the world. They are still trying to reach the needy and give service and salvation to the man that is down but never out.

Major Loney is well pleased with the Salvation army condition in Oregon, stating that the value of their property has increased amazingly and that the corps has grown in number beyond his hopes. He will preach at the Salvation army hall tonight at 7:30 p.m. and at 10:20 p.m. Thursday morning, he will preach the Thanksgiving services and 7:30 p.m. Thursday evening will preach on "Holiness in Action."

Major Loney visits each city once a year and is known throughout the western territory as a fine example for the younger officers and army workers.

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
